

Is Seeing Believing? By Pastor Larry

Do you remember the story of "The Emperor's New Clothes," by Hans Christian Andersen? Two conniving tailors took advantage of the emperor's arrogance and desire for new clothes. They told him that they had made a very special cloth for his garment, but only people of high and noble character difficult pursuit. We don't want to be like the emperor, parading before the world in our "briefs" or should we say, our "beliefs" - exposed, selfdeceived, and ignorant. We want to "know" the essentials even if we don't know it all, or even understand it all!

could see the fabric. The problem was that the emperor knew he was not noble, and therefore pretended to see the clothing. The time finally came and the emperor modeled the "special" clothing for his subjects.

To his amazement, the people gave accolades as to the beauty and quality of the garment. All appeared well until a small child's voice startled the crowd, "The emperor has no

clothes! The emperor has no clothes!" In this fable, the rather shortsighted tailors had sent the emperor into the kingdom in his underwear. The tailors had convinced the emperor and almost everyone else, to assert a *belief in something that was not real, in a garment that did not exist!*

Celebration aside, there are a good number of folks who will ask, in this season of Easter, is the resurrection real? Or have we accepted an early church's rendition of what we might call the "emperor's new clothes?" Are we pretending to see what we have been told, rather than what really happened?

None of us likes to be tricked or fooled into believing something that is not real. Our reaction to that is disappointment, and often anger. Yet, determining what is real and what is not real can be a is the sower of all true science." (Citation: *The Merging of Science and Spirit*). In an interview with the great scientist, G.S. Viereck asked Einstein, "Do you accept the historical existence of Jesus?" He replied, "Unquestionably! No one can read the Gospels without feeling the actual presence of Jesus. His personality pulsates in every word. No myth is filled with such life" (Citation: "What Life Means to Einstein," *Saturday Evening Post*, 26 October 1929).

On the other hand, take Carl Sagan, the renowned astronomer and educator. Jerry Adler wrote this insightful reflection in *Newsweek* about Sagan. He was "fascinated by the phenomenon that educated adults, with the wonders of science manifest all around them, could cling to beliefs based on the unverifiable testimony of observers dead for 2000 years. "You're so smart, why do you believe in God?" he once exclaimed to [cleric Joan Brown] Campbell. She found

this a surprising question from someone who had no trouble accepting the existence of black holes, which no one has ever observed. "You're so smart, why don't you believe in God?" she answered . . ."


Sagan never wavered in his agnosticism. "There was no deathbed conversion," [his wife Ann] Druyan says. "No appeals to God, no hope for an afterlife, no pretending that he and I, who had been inseparable

for twenty years, were not saying goodbye forever." Didn't he want to believe? she was asked. "Carl never wanted to believe," she replied fiercely. "He wanted to *know.*" (Source: Jerry Adler, *Newsweek*, March 31, 1997) One might say that the methodology of "science" was the god of Carl Sagan.

We can look at life through many lenses. What

about Jesus? For Jesus, the world of spirit was just as real as the physical world. He never wavered in his confidence in a God who could be trusted. However, this would be a challenging assumption for Jesus' followers on Easter morning. Mary Magdalene comes to the tomb of her Lord with her heart pounding in grief. She comes in the midst of grief and death. It is hard for faith to gain a foothold when all one sees is the reality of the tomb.

Remember that in John's Gospel, the themes of belief and unbelief, of seeing and knowing, are all masterfully woven into the narrative. All through John's presentation of Jesus, people are told to look around and pay attention to what they "see" so that they might believe in Jesus. For John, the answer to "What is real?" is to look closely at what Jesus "does." No "emperor's new clothes" on this Galilean! Recall that when Jesus recruited his disciples, he said to them, "Come and see" (John 1:39). Once people see Jesus doing "signs" they come to "know" him. Seeing and believing are vitally linked.



Mary comes alone to the graveyard to see what is happening. We quickly become aware that she cannot let go of Jesus. She is not ready to let go of what she thinks she "knows" about life and death. She assumes that Jesus is dead! Her view of what she believes is real and does not allow her to take in the mystery soon to be revealed before her very eyes. She responds to the situation, but only within the limits of her expectations. She sees that the

> stone has been rolled away. The tomb is open but she does not go inside.

> She runs back and gets Peter and John. Peter goes in first, then John, and we are told that John "saw and believed" (John 20:8b). Mary had remained outside the tomb. In uncertainty, she kneels down and looks into the death chamber. All that she can think about is

the body. There are two angels sitting where Jesus had lain. "Woman," they say, "why are you weeping?" Mary, even in the confusion of grief, is emphatic, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him" (John 20:13). Still focused on the *body*! Yet then she turns and sees who she believes is the caretaker. He says the same words, "Woman, why are you weeping?" Who are you looking for? . . . Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away" (John 20:15). *Still* focused on the body! Sometimes it is hard to let go of our belief in DEATH.

Then Jesus calls her by name: 'Mary.' And that's what it takes for Mary to turn around, away from an empty tomb, and away from seeing and believing in death to seeing and believing in LIFE. Being called by name! 'Mary.' She sees him in that moment and, finally, believes" (Marci Auld Glass). Now we are making progress. Mary has just graduated from a "lost body" to a "found Jesus." It may be one of the

General Conference Postponed Until 2024



The United Methodist Church and its predecessor bodies typically have held a General Conference at least every four years since 1792. With the 2020 General Conference now delayed to when the next one was supposed to take place, it remains unclear whether new delegates will need to be elected. The Rev. Gary Graves, General Conference secretary, said the commission would look to the Judicial Council, the denomination's top court, for clarity for what needs to be done should this be seen as a postponed General Conference instead of a new assembly.

Nonetheless, key points that remain to be addressed are:

- 1. Organizers say General Conference must be postponed because of visa wait times of up to two years.
- 2. With the announcement, leaders of a planned breakaway denomination have moved up the new church's launch date.

3. It is unclear whether new delegates will need to be elected for a General Conference, postponed to the next date.

Citing long wait times for visas, General Conference organizers announced that The United Methodist Church's top lawmaking assembly — long postponed by pandemic — must wait until 2024. *"We engaged in a fair, thorough, integrity-filled discussion of the alternatives,"* said Kim Simpson, chairperson of the Commission on the General Conference.

"The visa issue is a reality that is simply outside our control as we seek to achieve a reasonable threshold of delegate presence and participation. Ultimately our decision reflects the hope that 2024 will afford greater opportunity for global travel and a higher degree of protection for the health and safety of delegates and attendees."

General Conference was scheduled to be in Minneapolis this year. In the press statement, the commission said a new already-secured venue would be announced at a later date as soon as logistical planning is complete. Bishops do not have a vote on the commission. After the commission's announcement, Council of Bishops President Cynthia Fierro Harvey said that she and her fellow bishops would begin "to explore various pathways for sustaining the worldwide mission and witness of The United Methodist Church, given the announcement of this further and understandable delay."

Meanwhile, leaders of a planned new theologically conservative denomination announced that they are moving up the launch date without waiting for General Conference to act. This marks the third delay of what many have expected to be a pivotal global gathering. After decades of intensifying debate and defiance of church bans on same-sex weddings and "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy, the coming General Conference faces multiple proposals for denominational separation. The most endorsed of these is the <u>Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace through Separation</u> which if adopted, would allow churches and conferences that support bans on gay weddings and ordination to leave with church property and \$25 million in United Methodist funds to form a new "traditionalist" denomination. That new denomination, the Global Methodist Church, had plans to launch in conjunction with General Conference later this year. However, the new denomination's Transitional Leadership Team announced plans to move the launch date up to May 1, 2022.

The decision to postpone again was not an easy one, said Simpson, the commission chair. *"The commission appreciates that many people are disappointed about the circumstances of the 2020 General Conference and shares in the disappointment that it has not been able to be held,"* she said in the press statement. *"COVID-19 has tested the collective patience, understanding, compassion, resolve, and even faith of the world."*

Commission members remain hopeful and pray that the world's circumstances improve to help make the next General Conference not only possible, but a reminder of the witness of The United Methodist Church as a global representation of the body of Christ.

control. Jesus says, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father."

We all know that for many reasons we cannot always "believe" what we "see." Our limitations, expectations, and ignorance cloud our vision. Yet at a spiritual level, John is clarifying our vision. He says, "Seeing in believing!" Mary begins to believe when she sees Jesus' face and hears his voice. She may have seen Lazarus called out of the tomb; seen the man born blind regain his sight; seen the water turned into fine wine, and seen the great crowds being fed on barely nothing. She saw Jesus fight with the leaders, who were blinded by their pride and expectations. Finally, Jesus told them: "If you can't believe that God sent me to be your Messiah, then *at the very least* recognize that God is revealing himself through my works."

In the midst of a world of cutting-edge science and stunning technology, of surprising goodness and unbridled and entrenched evil, of the mystery of creation and the beauty of life - in all of this - *that is* where Jesus calls each of you by your name to respond in faith by the power of his Spirit.

It is in the tombs of our lives that we find the living Christ. Remember, it was outside of the tomb where Jesus speaks to Mary. Jesus frees us of our self -imprisoned tombs. Like Mary, Jesus stands before you, and calls your name, and says, "Believe in me! I am Resurrection and Life!"

THE BEAUTIFUL MUSIC OF THE LENTEN SEASON

We sing many beautiful hymns during Lent. The words bring us hope, comfort and peace. I have chosen three to write about this month. Learning the background of the hymns makes them even more personal to me.

THERE IS A BALM IN GILEAD African-American Spiritual


In the Old Testament, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. He reminds them that He is ultimately in control, and only He can relieve their suffering. In the New Testament, God answers the suffering of His people by sending His own son to take our place. Jesus becomes our "balm in Gilead." It is Him we are called to turn to in our times of trial for healing and comfort. We sing this

song with that assurance: no matter our hardships or supposed shortcomings, Jesus loves us enough to take our suffering upon Himself.

SAVIOR, LIKE A SHEPHERD LEAD US Words - attributed to Dorothy A. Thrupp (1836) Music - Bradbury (tune name)

Many versifications of Psalm 23 act as hymns of assurance and confessions of trust. We know the text well – "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." This text, attributed to Dorothy Thrupp, differs from those texts. Rather than an assertion of our faith, it is a prayer that stems from our faith. It goes, if you will, a step further than the psalm's declaration. We know that God is our Shepherd. We know why we trust. And because we have that trust, we ask that God be faithful. We acknowledge our dependency and our emptiness, and ask that God would provide. We ask not in doubt, but in faith. Every verse of this hymn contains a promise we have from God, and a prayer we make because of that promise. This is how we are called to live our lives as followers of Christ – in prayer, because of faith. Thrupp's text is a beautiful example of how we might live out that calling.




RESONANCE: EASTER CONCERT Saturday, April 9th at 7:00 PM
