
As we come together in worship and fellowship, let's remember that we are united by a common purpose – to share the message of God's love with the world.

Cinnamon Apple Crisp

Ingredients

- 4-5 medium-sized apples, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour (can substitute gluten-free flour)
- 1/2 cup old-fashioned oats
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup cold butter, cubed

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 375°F. Grease a baking dish.
- 2. In a bowl, toss the apple slices with lemon juice and vanilla extract. Place them evenly in the greased baking dish.
- 3. In a separate bowl, combine the flour, oats, brown sugar, and cinnamon. Cut in the cold butter using a fork or pastry cutter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.
- 4. Sprinkle the topping evenly over the apples in the baking dish.
- 5. Bake for about 30-35 minutes or until the apples are tender and the topping is golden brown.
- 6. Serve warm with a dollop of whipped cream or a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Enjoy!

The Power of Love

I WOULD LIKE TO introduce an experience shared by Dr. Ihn Namkoong, an emergency medicine specialist, during his time at a hospital in Korea, as quoted directly from his Facebook.

"This is a story from five years ago, when I was working as an intern in Jinju. A young man, 26 years old, arrived at the emergency room early in the morning with a brain injury from a fall at a construction site. His face and head were severely damaged, making it impossible to recognize his original appearance, and he had lost consciousness completely. I quickly administered emergency measures, but the chances of survival seemed slim. In a condition similar to being in a vegetative state, he lay in the intensive care unit with a breathing apparatus. That morning, as I anxiously watched him, his Electrocardiogram (ECG) suddenly changed from a regular and normal heartbeat to a ventricular tachycardia (V-tach) wave. The ECG curve, which had shown rhythmic and normal human heartbeats, suddenly indicated weakening and loss of strength, a sign that death was imminent. I had never seen someone survive more than 10 minutes after such a change in the ECG curve.

Feeling the impending fate, I went out of the intensive care unit and told the waiting family that it was time to come and watch over the patient as he approached death. The family had already given up on any measures (such as CPR) for the patient and accepted his death as inevitable. Some relatives, presumably the young man's parents, were tearfully saying their final goodbyes, treating him as if he were already a lifeless body. With a heavy heart, I left the intensive care unit. I instructed the nurse to transfer the patient to the morgue as soon as the ECG waves stopped. As the evening passed, occupied with caring for numerous emergency patients, I did not think much more about him. The emergency room was almost like a battlefield hospital every day, with exhausted bodies dealing with various cases. That night, I spent the night with a tired body, not thinking much more about him. The next morning, for some reason, I felt compelled to visit the intensive care unit again. Although it was a natural assumption that there would be no one there or another patient would be lying in the now-empty bed, I couldn't shake the thought of him from my mind.

Upon entering the room, I couldn't believe my eyes once again. He was still there. Despite his extremely fragile state, his ECG continued to draw a faint but persistent waveform, indicating that his soul had not completely left his body. Witnessing this, I felt something indescribable. I sensed the presence of something beyond scientific and medical understanding. I had detected an existence that went beyond what medical knowledge could explain. I had never witnessed such a phenomenon before or after that day. As two more days passed with his ECG drawing slow waveforms, indicating life, I visited the intensive care unit again the next morning. His body seemed lifeless, but for some unknown reason, his soul still lingered faintly in this world. The monitor screen displaying the ECG waves confirmed the situation, and my unusual feeling supported it.

Suddenly, a young woman entered the intensive care unit. She had not been among the guardians before, and it seemed as if she had hurriedly come after receiving some unexpected news from afar. The young man's lover, it turned out. She looked as if she might collapse to the floor at any moment, with a pale face and tears silently streaming down her cheeks. I moved aside to allow her to come close to the bed. Without saying a word, the young woman stood beside the bed, shedding tears. At that moment, his ECG waveform suddenly stopped. The continuous wave that had been appearing on the monitor disappeared in an instant, replaced by a straight line, as if the power had been switched off. His heart, which had been weakly beating for the past two days, had stopped at that very moment. My chest chilled instantly, and I felt a tremendous, inexplicable emotion.

Now, he had truly left this world, leaving behind the young woman beside him. I left the intensive care unit, conveyed the news of (continued on page 13)



City of Mesa & AARP Foundation Experience Corps Seek Volunteers to Help K-3 Students Become Better Readers

(Mesa, Arizona) — THE CITY OF MESA is seeking volunteers for <u>AARP</u> Foundation





Beginning in January 2024, the program and its volunteers will provide a total average of 180

Experience Corps, an intergenerational, community-based program that engages volunteers ages 50 and older as tutors and mentors to help K-3 students become proficient readers by the end of third grade.

Children who are not able to read at grade level by the end of third grade are four times more likely not to graduate from high school or attend and complete college. They are also likely to earn lower incomes throughout their lives. Experience Corps makes a lasting difference in the lives of America's most vulnerable children in high-need elementary schools while offering mental and physical health benefits to volunteers.

"Reading skills are a key building block for success, and I'm thrilled that Mesa is launching the Experience Corps program to give our 1st, 2nd and 3rd graders extra support," said Mesa Mayor John Giles. "Helping children with their literacy skills is both rewarding and a meaningful opportunity to have a lasting impact. I encourage every retiree in Mesa to consider getting involved."

Experience Corps has established active programs in over twenty cities across the country, including Phoenix, Tempe, and Pinal County. With the support of Experience Corps and Read On Arizona, a statewide collaboration focused on childhood literacy, Mesa is proud to join in efforts to bring in high quality literacy tutoring to Mesa Public Schools.

hours of support each week at six Mesa Public Schools tutoring and mentoring children who are not yet reading at grade level. Tutoring will continue through May 2024, with plans for continuation of the program in the 2024-2025 school year.

"In Mesa Public Schools we know literacy is a currency that is needed for a healthy and successful life." said Dr. Andi Fourlis, Superintendent of Mesa Public Schools. "We are excited to welcome Experience Corp reading tutors into our elementary schools. Our students have so much to gain from working with trained tutors who will help them strengthen their reading skills and become confident readers."

To qualify, volunteers must be at least 50 years of age, have earned a high school diploma or GED and must undergo a screening process. All Experience Corps volunteers receive extensive training and onsite support.

AARP Foundation Experience Corps Mesa is currently holding informational sessions to learn about the program, fill out an application, and complete an interview with City of Mesa staff members. If interested in volunteering, sign-up today.

during December. Shirts may be ordered by design (three styles to choose from), size, and color for \$20 each with delivery in Jan 2024.



IF YOU HAVE an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are age seventy (or getting close), you should know about a way you can give to your local church that will strengthen the church's ministry and produce tax savings for you! Here are some important facts you should know.

- 1. INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS HAVE COME OF AGE (MIDDLE-AGE). IRAs have been around since 1974, though in the beginning, they were only for folks who didn't have any other pension coverage. A bill in 1981 made all workers and their spouses eligible for these accounts. That's a solid forty-plus years that people have been putting money away without having to pay federal taxes on it. (That part is important.)
- 2. YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU OR LEAVE YOUR MONEY THERE FOREVER. The understanding was that those folks could access that money without a penalty as early as when they turned fifty-nine and a half, but when they reached seventy and a half, they were required to start taking at least a minimum amount out each year—"required minimum distributions" or RMDs. At the outset of the coronavirus pandemic, the age for these

RMDs was raised to seventy-two. Since participants didn't pay tax on the money when they put it in their IRAs, they are required to pay tax on it when money comes out. RMDs can push some people into a higher tax bracket. That can be avoided...

- 3. GIVE IT TO THE CHURCH; AVOID PAYING THE **TAXES.** In 2006, pension protection legislation allowed for tax-free use of RMDs for charitable contributions, saving the tax that people would have had to pay when they took this money out of their IRA accounts. These are called "qualified charitable distributions" or QCDs. Here's an important distinction: these are NOT tax deductions. They do not provide a charitable deduction regardless of whether you itemize deductions. The tax benefit is the ability to exclude the donated distribution from taxable income! Here's an example: If you were planning to give \$1000 per month to your church, you don't qualify for more than the standard deduction amount, and you are at the 12% tax bracket—giving that amount from your IRA (as a QCD) will save you \$1440 in taxes! If you are in the 22% tax bracket, the savings will be \$2640!
- 4. FROM IRA TO "MY UMC"—NEVER IN MY POCKET! With a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), a check goes directly from your IRA to your church or the charity you select. Many people who are facing RMDs that will have tax implications could pay all their annual (continued on page 14)

tithe or offering at one time, hopefully early in the year, through their QCD and never have to show it as income.

5. YOU DON'T HAVE TO WAIT FOR 72 TO DO THE QCD! While Congress recently raised the age for RMDs to seventy-two, QCDs can happen for anyone who has reached the age of seventy and a half. Retirees who are over that age and want to continue to be generous to their local church should consider a qualified charitable distribution.

6. MOST TAXPAYERS NO LONGER GET A TAX BREAK FOR CHARITABLE GIVING. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act that went into effect in 2019 and 2020 included an increase in the standard deduction—it nearly doubled. That standard deduction is the threshold that your itemized deductions have to exceed to make itemizing

worthwhile. It left many people better off, but with 90% of taxpayers taking the standard deduction (which does not require any evidence of charitable giving), it eliminated a tax-incentive regarding charitable donations for most of us (not to say that this is the main reason people give to the church). Inviting retirees in the seventy-plus group (who use the standard deduction) to consider using the qualifying charitable distribution may reduce or eliminate the tax that they might have to pay on RMDs. Yet many will not know of this option unless your church makes the invitation!

We encourage everyone to discuss this with a financial planner, tax consultant, or attorney—and be sure to let your family know! It could be a savings for you and a blessing to your local church!

JUST THE FACTS please, Just the facts!!! (Mind boggling)

- 1.Global plastics has reached an estimated 460 million metric tons in recent years.
- 2. It is estimated that 75 to 199 million tons of plastic are currently in our Oceans.
- 3. One million plastic bottles are purchased every minute worldwide, while up to five trillion plastic bags are used in a year.
- 4. Americans purchase about 50 billion water bottles per year, averaging about 13 bottles per month for every person in the U.S.! That means by using a reusable water bottle, you could save an average of 156 plastic bottles annually.

RE: single use plastics

5.8.3 billion tons (9.1 billion U.S. tons) of plastic has been produced since plastic was introduced in the 1050's.

- 6. 79% of plastic that has been made still sits in landfills or the natural environment (with the exception of the small amount that has been incinerated or recycled).
- 7. When plastic ends up in landfills, They are not harmless!!! They break down into tiny toxic particles that contaminate the soil and waterways and enter the food chain when animals accidently ingest them.
