Devoted to Generosity!

As we enter the month of February, our congregational hearts and minds turn to stewardship. The first half of the month will focus on the theme, "Devoted to Generosity," and the scriptural emphasis will come from Acts 9:36-42. This passage focuses on the

story of Tabitha, also known by many as Dorcas. This may seem like a strange theme for stewardship, yet the story of Tabitha is a wonderfully triumphant reaffirmation of any church or individual enduring challenging times.

However, "crisis" may be a more accurate

word than "challenging," and one that we can relate to the past year. The story of Tabitha is a reminder that in any circumstance of life God can empower us to find ways to be devoted to generous hearts and deeds.

The story of Tabitha in Acts 9:36-42 is a passage that seeks to reassure the faith community that while Jesus may have left the building (at the Ascension in chapter 1), his power is still at work in the church through the teachings of the Apostles and the presence of the Holy Spirit. It is important to


note that Tabitha, given the designation as disciple, was dedicated to good works and acts of charity.

There is a back story that is critical to our understanding of this text. Tabitha has a particular ministry to the widows in her community, and when she dies, the church—

especially the widows, experience a crisis. Now what? We know that the Apostle Peter is summoned to come at once. He prays for the dead woman. When he finishes, he looks at the body and says, "Tabitha, get up!", and she does!

The resurrection power of Jesus is at work in the church, and it is the main point

of the story. Yet to the careful reader, there is more. If proving the power of Jesus was still at work through the resurrection of a dead body, well most any "body" would do just fine. Yet it is not just any "body," it is Tabitha's life that is restored—the one who was dedicated to generosity! One can argue that her ministry was so important that the church could not afford to have it stopped by her physical death. Tabitha continues her acts of charity when she is raised to life!

One can also see that Tabitha's life is a metaphor for the church. We can see generosity as life giving, but even beyond that, we can see that for the church to be the church, it has to be like Tabitha: devoted to caring generosity. In the Old Testament, God's prophets indicated that the community should care for the widow, the orphan, and the disenfranchised. In the New Testament, the church is the new community of caring.

Today, the church is at its best when it practices the life-giving practices of caring, sharing, and generosity. The real issue is moving from the transactional to the relational. Such a move is at the core of stewardship. Tabitha had a relationship with the widows and the garments she made were beautiful, which is a way of saying they gave dignity to the one who wore them.

Stewardship is about more than the transactions we make with our money. It is a whole-life, relational response to God and God's abundant generosity. It is intentional and impactful deployment of all our spiritual gifts. It is a way of giving that flows from the heart in concrete ways in response to what God has already done. Being devoted to generosity is life giving for both the practitioner of generosity and the recipient.

Lest we forget, the Bible is concerned about money at two basic levels: first, what money can provide and how we relate to its use; and second, how we use what moves through our sphere of influence toward advancing the principles of the Kingdom of God. Do we use what has been shared with

us to make a difference or to make ourselves more comfortable? Do we own our stuff, or is it the other way around? Yes, we need to ask people to support the mission and ministry of our congregation. Yet will we have only talked about money and the need of the church to receive it, or will we take a holistic approach and invite persons to give from a deeper, more spiritual place?

Join us in our spiritual quest! We will focus on stewardship on February 6th and 13th. Our Commitment Sunday will be February 13th, and we will celebrate with the presentation of our Commitment Cards, and also a time of fellowship around a delicious brunch. Stewardship materials will be sent to you the last week of January. See you in church!


truly be ready to rise at Easter.

RESPONSE (the magazine of women in mission) by Mary Killgrove

An article in the November/December 2021 issue of the Response magazine entitled "A Legacy of Love" discusses the role that UMW played in helping people of India when a more highly contagious variant of Covid-19 took hold in that country in the early summer of 2021. UMW quickly partnered with many long-term community, hospital and

educational centers to support women and children that were underserved in the community. Chandran Nair, a former executive at UMW, said that "Everything shut down" and "We were not allowed to go out, confined to homes except to buy groceries and medicines." UMW stepped in to offer short-term aid to our partner Imayam Social Welfare Association, supporting women and children with dry goods, masks and sanitary items. The UMW is still distributing food in India today and continues to work together with other organizations to lessen global suffering.

UMW READING PROGRAM by Billie Larime

I recommend this book. No Justice: One White Police Officer by Robbie Tolan. This is a helpful book to understanding the systemic racism that may occur when police officers encounter a suspect in a crime. This is a true story of Robbie Tolan, a young male African American accused of stealing his own car at his own house. A case of incorrect information from the police department led to a white police officer shooting an unarmed innocent person. The police officer was found not guilty of manslaughter in a trial. Hopefully this case will give us reason to promote police reform. This chilling true story has racial implications for when police make a mistaken arrest that results in injury or death on an innocent person. Is an innocent person entitled to civil restitution for the mistake, or do police have rights to immunity? This is a serious question.




