Then she goes on:


"But I'd like the pie heated and I don't want the ice cream on top, I want it on the side, and I'd like strawberry instead of vanilla if you have it, if not then no ice cream just whipped cream but only if it's real; if it's out of the can then nothing."

Waitress: "Not even the pie?"

Sally Albright: "No, I want the pie, but then not heated."

We all looked at her as incredulously as Harry did. Movies and sitcoms love to poke fun at picky eaters. And some of us take those lessons to heart—too much to heart. The first time my husband cooked for me—it was our fourth date—he made a vegan meal that used a meat substitute made primarily of gluten, the protein in wheat. It was delicious. A few weeks later, he was at my house and I made a dessert, and was proud of the fact that it was glutenfree. Fyn casually asked, "Oh? Who's gluten intolerant?" "Uh oh!" I thought. Because I am the one who is gluten intolerant. Why didn't I say anything when he served me gluten? The best I could come up with was, "I didn't want to be THAT person." I didn't want to be the fussy one that causes problems and is ungrateful. I didn't want to be Sally.

"But you ARE that person! I poisoned you!" he exclaimed. That's a bit of an exaggeration. I'm intolerant, but I don't have celiac. It won't literally




Wednesday night and one of the attendees mentioned that she had eaten before coming because she had dietary restrictions and did not expect the food to meet her needs.

There are many of us who need special care, whether it is a special diet, assistance getting around, or meetings and worship that come to you (via Zoom or livestream). God made us all unique, with different interests, different abilities, and different needs. We should value each other enough to honor how God made us

different, even our special needs. We should not have to worry that people will judge us, or be unwilling to help us, if we let people know what we need.

As the Body of Christ, we are to treat others the way we would want to be treated. We all want our needs met. We want food that doesn't make us sick. Meetings or classes that include us, not ones with barriers to our participation. There are simple things we can do to help others. When bringing food to share, we can label the food with the ingredients so people with diet restrictions can determine whether it is safe for them to eat. When planning meetings, we should consider driving and mobility limitations. If driving is a problem, we can help arrange rides. Is it possible for the meeting to be on Zoom, so people can attend from home?

This is a two way street. We can best meet someone's needs when they share those needs with us. This is all part of caring for (continued on page 2)

# Slow Cooker GREEK CHICKEN

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 tbsp olive oil or avocado oil
- 3 cloves garlic
- 2 lbs chicken thighs boneless, skinless
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper (can use lemon pepper)
- 1 12 oz jar marinated roasted red peppers drained and diced
- 18 oz jar marinated artichoke hearts drained
- 1 cup kalamata olives
- 1/2 medium red onion sliced
- 3/4 cup chicken broth
- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
- 1/2 lemon juiced
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1-2 tbsp arrowroot starch
- (optional)
- 1/2 cup crumbled feta (optional)

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Begin by heating a skillet to medium high heat.

  While skillet is heating, salt and pepper each side of your chicken thighs. Sear chicken on each side for about 2 minutes (no need to cook all the way through). Place chicken on the bottom of your slow cooker. Now arrange the artichoke hearts, peppers, and olives around the chicken filling in the gaps on the bottom of your slow cooker.
- 2. Cook the onions in the same skillet until softened. Add ¼ C of the broth to deglaze the pan. When the onions are about done, add the garlic and cook just until the garlic is fragrant. Pour the onions and garlic, along with any broth, over the chicken and other vegetables.
- 3. In a bowl, mix together 1/2 cup of chicken broth, vinegar, lemon, dried oregano, and dried thyme. Pour on top of the chicken/vegetable mixture. Cover and cook for 4 hours on low or 2-3 hours on high. Remove lid.
- 4. (Optional) Spoon out some of the liquid into a small bowl once cooking is complete. Add 1 tbsp of arrowroot starch to the liquid, whisk, and pour back into the slow cooker. Allow the sauce to thicken for another 15–20 minutes before serving.
- 5. Serve over potatoes, rice, or cauliflower rice. Top with optional feta.

## **Hands...** An Emotional Expression

THE STORY I AM ABOUT TO SHARE may be controversial, as some believe it is a fictional story constructed around one of Albrecht's masterpieces. Yet, others believe the story is true. Whether the legend is true or is just a fable, it does not matter. We can learn many life lessons from this story.

The story begins with a fully-aged father who works as a goldsmith 16-18 hours a day to ensure that his family of eighteen will have one meal for the day. The family lives in a small village near Nuremberg, Germany. They are known as the Dürer family. The two older children have similar dreams; they both aspire to one day become artists. However, their financial condition is very low. As a family, they are always struggling every week to make ends meet. In these days, learning the art skill is so expensive that it is only affordable for rich folks. This reality saddens them. Their financial condition disheartens the Duren brothers even more. They know that their father will never agree to send them to Nuremberg to study at the art academy. So, they don't ask.

One person's suffering can transform another and even have an extraordinary effect on the world. According to the story, Albrecht Dürer (1471-1528) and his younger brother Albert make an arrangement so one of them can go to the art academy: they will toss a coin. The loser of the coin toss will work in the coalmines to support the winning brother during his years of study. Four years later, they will reverse roles: the brother who went to school will now work and make money to support the other brother as he studies and pursues his dreams of becoming an artist.

One Sunday morning, after the prayer at the Church, they toss the coin. Albrecht Durer wins the toss and goes to Nuremberg's art Academy. While Albert goes down into the harmful and dangerous mines to earn money for his brother's fees, Albrecht spends four years learning and applying his trade, proving to be something of a prodigy at drawing, painting, and woodcutting—even surpassing his teachers in artistic

ability.

Four years pass. Albrecht becomes a famous German Renaissance artist. His artwork is far better than any of his contemporaries. Albrecht's family offers a festive dinner celebration for him and afterwards, he offers a toast for

his beloved brother Albert. He exclaims, "I have lived my dream. I have fulfilled my lifelong passion. I am grateful to Albert for making this day a reality. So now, as promised, it is your turn, Albert. Go to Nuremberg to pursue your dream, and I will take care of the expenses."

Albert breaks down sobbing. He shows his brother his working hands and says, "Look what life has done to me. Look what those mines have done to my hands. They are no more the hands of an artist; they are hard and stiff. The bones in my hands can hardly hold anything, as I have been suffering from arthritis. These hands are not delicate and soft for a paintbrush and a canvas. However, you, my brother, have fulfilled the dream for both of us."

Albrecht does not know how to respond. He hugs his brother, and says nothing.

Then, one day, to honor his brother, Albrecht painstakingly draws something that changes the definition of painting. He draws Albert's bruised hands with palms held together and fragile fingers stretched upwards naming this emotionally expressive painting "Hands." (Continued on page 5.)

## Commitment Sunday is Coming—February 19, 2023

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP IS FAR MORE than a way to pay church bills. Stewardship is really about God's calling on us and our faithfulness with the gifts God has given. We see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our pastors will be focusing on the biblical and spiritual principles of commitment, covenant and generous giving in our new worship series—A Covenant of Love: Commit to Self, to Community and to God.

A Covenant of Love is based on the biblical philosophy that true stewardship is based on a commitment to three relationships: A Commitment to Self and My Relationship with God; A Commitment to Community (to love my neighbor as myself and to love others as Jesus loves me); and A Commitment to God, to Ministry, and to the Body of Christ. These commitments focus on giving as part of our own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. We will be encouraging people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the questions, "How is God calling me to be faithful?" and "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Commitment Celebration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Commitment Celebration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship we will have a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Commitment Celebration Sunday events through our volunteers and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Commitment Celebration Sunday worship, and the catered luncheon that follows.





WE START A NEW YEAR WITH NEW LEGISLATION that opens the door for a different way to give. Last week President Biden signed legislation that adds a new opportunity for giving from your IRA.

For those who are at least 70.5 or older and have a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), there is now an opportunity to make a one-time Qualified Charitable Distribution of \$50,000 and use it to set up a charitable gift annuity through DSUMF. A charitable gift annuity pays income to a single donor or a donor and spouse for their lifetimes.

The Qualified Charitable Distribution lets you take the \$50,000 out of your IRA without paying income tax on it. As the payments come back to you over your lifetime, the income is taxable. For many folks, being able to spread out the income over their lifetimes will prove to be an advantage.

Whatever is left when you are gone can go to your church or other favorite nonprofit. Many people appreciate knowing the exact amount that will be coming to them quarterly or annually and the fact that it is guaranteed for life.

The amount we pay is based on your age. For example, the rates below reflect the percentage of the initial amount:

70	5.9	
75	6.6	
80	7.6	
85	8.7	
90+	9.7	

Two Life Annuity	
Ages	Rate
65 & 65	4.7
70 & 70	5.2

A single person age 75 who uses an IRA to fund a \$50,000 gift annuity would receive \$3,300 a year -- payable quarterly, annually, or semi-annually. That annual amount may well be less than you would have to take out as an RMD.
