Flashbacks With Music

Music is a gift. Remember your years as a teenager when music was everything? Perhaps it was your passion and it was above any criticism or scrutiny. It was so easy to memorize those lyrics and they provoked our

imaginations to just... daydream. During the Memorial Day weekend, I stumbled across the song *"Born on the Bayou"* by Credence Clearwater Revival. Needless to say, it evoked deep rooted memories from my childhood in the 70's, driving my bicycle with the high handle bars and the blue banana seat.

You ever notice the music at the mall, at the Doctor's office and of course – the commercials on TV? Most of the time, this music functions as a means to fill the "background" rather than as an opportunity for participation. I think it's worthwhile to say that our souls have also been created to respond to music in foundational ways. Just like certain songs are deeply connected to our memories, we also have songs that are deeply connected to our faith. The role of music in worship is biblical. Music has been part of the Christian experience from the beginning. Exodus 15 says that "After escaping from the Egyptians and crossing the Red Sea, the people of Israel sang a song to the Lord (Exod. 15)". Singing was part of Israel's formal worship in both the tabernacle and the temple. The faithful raise their voices in song to God say the Psalms. In joy and sorrow, in praise and lament sing unto the Lord.

The principal direction of congregational singing is to the Lord (Ps. 96:1). Music is made first of all to the Lord, and only secondarily to each other. It needs to communicate and express a sense of awe and wonder in the presence of God. In Colossians 3:16-17, the Apostle Paul shared a strong testimony in the words *"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns,* and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

Reformed theologian Karl Barth points out that singing is not an option for the people of God; it is one of the essential ministries of the church: He further adds *"The Christian church sings. It is not a choral society. Its singing is not a concert. But from inner, material necessity it sings. Singing is the highest form of human expression....What we can and must say quite confidently is that the church which does not sing is not the church. The congregation is always the primary choir."*

We all have songs that connect to our faith. These are songs that make God's presence more relational and evident to us, songs that speak to our hearts and souls - like nothing else. Many of us could say that these songs, hymns or spirituals, are deeply



rooted in our memories. Perhaps it is an old hymn that you associated with the grandparents who were shining examples in faith, or perhaps it was the song that was playing when you first committed to follow Jesus. Other deep faith songs might be ones that spoke truth and reassurance into our lives when we needed it the most. Or, they are songs that put our most important beliefs to words in a way that we cannot.

Our lives are surrounded with music. Worship is a "living sacrifice," and therefore our gifts to God should represent some cost to us. Music should lead our thoughts toward God rather than toward ourselves. And again I say... *The faithful raise their voices in song to God*.

The United Methodist Church & Ukrainian Refugees Update

Activities of The United Methodist Church in the Central Conference of Central and Southern Europe with/for Refugees from Ukraine Summary of June 14, 2022

Because it is bright Currently, daytime duration is still increasing – and this somehow makes a difference. Two participants of the recent online meeting focusing on the activities with/for refugees from Ukraine also referred to this reality: Denis Kim, who joined the meeting from Kyiv, described the situation in Ukraine's capital as "a little better" than one month ago... And when Jana Křížova, pastor and coordinator of the work with/for refugees in Czechia, described some aspects of the situation in her country, she echoed this assumption. This does not change... anything of the

fact that in the countries neighboring to Ukraine, particularly those who did not (yet) decide to permanently stay in their host country but still hope to return to Ukraine one day, are living in a situation of very stressful uncertainty and difficult waiting... But given the fact that the daytime duration will soon start to decrease again, it might serve as a reminder to those accompanying refugees from Ukraine how important it is not to grow weary of bringing a light of love and hope into the lives of these people. And this is what United Methodists in the countries directly or indirectly neighboring to Ukraine – and in Ukraine itself – are continuing to do.

<u>Czechia</u>

- According to Mária Kunstová, members of Třeboň UMC have started an integration group for Ukrainian families in their premises that is open every weekday. The aim of this project, which was implemented in cooperation with the town of Třeboň, was to help mothers with young children with childcare, as the kindergartens in Třeboň do not have free capacity.
- In Tachov, distribution of clothing in the church, which had been uninterested for several week, is beginning to pick up again as the Red Cross is running low on supplies, said pastor Jana Daněčková.

<u>Hungary</u>

- The UMC in Hungary continued to bring humanitarian aid (food donations) to both the UMC in Ukraine and to a refugee camp near Debrecen, where more than 170 people are living, as Luca Birtalan reported.
- The Church received 500 copies of a Ukrainian youth Bible. Some were passed on to refugees in Hungary, others will be brought to Ukraine. Activities of The United Methodist Church in the Central Conference of Central and Southern Europe with/for Refugees from Ukraine Summary of June 14, 2022

<u>Poland</u>

- Kielce UMC and Puławy UMC organized transports of food, clothes and medical supplies to Ukraine. Additionally, they are preparing a consignment for an orphanage in Poland with children from Ukraine.
- The UMC in Poland, together with other organizations, also helps people that would like to return to their houses in Ukraine with transportation.

The Power of Our Hymns

Although all good music can have a powerful effect on us, one kind of music, the hymn, has a unique influence that goes beyond music as an art. As the scriptures are to

great literature, so are the hymns to great music.

Many people, myself included, have been blessed by the hymns. Lives have been touched as hymns have brought about conversion or increased testimony. Hymns have given comfort, courage, or strength by opening communication through the Holy Spirit.

A favorite hymn, "How Great Thou Art", brought comfort to a women in need. She writes:

"We were two thousand miles away from our home in Alberta, Canada, visiting our daughter's family. My husband, who had sprained his ankle the evening we arrived, was in the hospital with a blood clot. He lay in a bed, immobilized, with an IV in his arm.

"As I left his room after my first visit, I felt a little blue. I was in an unfamiliar place, lonely and worried about the responsibilities we had waiting for us at home.

"Our daughter wanted some things for the baby, so we stopped at a department store. Because I didn't feel like shopping, I walked over to a clerk demonstrating a beautiful electric organ.

"Do you play?" he asked.

"Only a little," I replied.

"Sit down and try it then." I sat and softly played... "How Great Thou Art." Suddenly, I heard a lady singing along with me. Her rich soprano voice and the sound of the organ had attracted people from all over the store. The clerk pushed button after button until the organ sounded like a whole orchestra. Suddenly I felt strong. The words of the song brought me a message. We would get home safely, everything would be all right.

"The blessing of the music and words at that time seemed heaven-sent to lift me up and I thanked my Father in Heaven for the power of sacred music."

May 2022 Apportionments Continued To Improve

May apportionment receipts continued at a higher level than last year. Like last year, the Conference fully paid one month (8.3%) of

2022 apportionments for all of our churches. Our churches paid another 27.8%, resulting in an overall apportionments receipt level of 36.1% for the first five months of the year. That was 0.7% better than last year's level. At this rate, we project year-end apportionment receipts of about 82%.

Apportionment receipts through May are shown graphically as follows:


Overall, the Conference remains in strong financial shape. Our available cash reserves are at \$3.0 million, down only slightly from \$3.1 million at the beginning of this year. We had an overall operating deficit of \$521,000 due to: payment of our general church apportionments at 100%; payment of one month of apportionments for all churches in the Conference; investment losses; and COVID-impacted losses in our camp and retreat ministries (particularly at Mingus Mountain Camp). This operating deficit was lower than it might have been as a result of reduced travel, operating efficiencies, and lower staff costs in many of areas of ministry. So we are thankful for that, just as we are thankful for your continued support of our connectional system through your apportionment contributions.

Apportionments are a way to look beyond just ourselves. Please do all that you can to help our churches and our ministries continue to change lives by contributing apportionments as fully as possible in the remaining seven months of 2022. Thanks again for your commitment; it truly provides the financial stability for our connectional programs to work.
