

How Does the Spirit Move? By Pastor Larry


Pentecost Sunday will soon be upon us. It commemorates what we think of as the "birthday of the church." It is not an accident that this great "harvest" of souls should occur at the Feast of

Pentecost, or Weeks. It marked the end of the celebration of the spring harvest, a cycle that began at Passover. Every devout Israelite family would praise God during this time for his grace and bounty. For Jewish Christians, the coming of the Holy Spirit at this time would take on special significance. Pentecost was all about God taking the initiative to enter more fully into our lives.

There is truly an undeniable mystery in this event. You may recall that Jesus said the Spirit "blows wherever it wishes," like the wind

(John 3:8). The Spirit is unpredictable! The Spirit filled Elizabeth, Mary, and Zechariah with song (Luke 1). The Spirit overshadowed Mary (Luke 1:35); descended like a dove on Jesus at his baptism (Luke 3:22); led Jesus into the wilderness (Luke 4:1); and came upon Jesus to proclaim good news, release, recovery of sight, and liberation respectively to the poor, the captives, the blind, and the oppressed (Luke 4:18). Amber Essick said, "We don't make sense of the Spirit; it makes sense of us." In an unpredictable, but not arbitrary fashion, the Holy Spirit made sense of the purposes of God in the lives of these and many other individuals.

As the early church took shape, the Spirit led in creative and unexpected twists and turns, often counter-intuitive and quite startling! The fact is that the early church had a lot to sort out! Take for example, the issue of baptism. Two baptisms were recognized. One was of water, which was linked to repentance and becoming a Christian, and the other, of the Holy Spirit, which was tied to being empowered to live the Christian life. Over the long history of the church, the connection between water baptism and "Spirit" baptism has been recognized, but in differing



ways and degrees by varying traditions within Christianity.

These two baptisms made sense to very first "Hebrew" Jewish Christians who were baptized and had experienced Pentecost. Yet what happens when these baptisms intersect in an alien world that is filled with mistrust and hatred? We learn about that in the dramatic events in Acts 8.

It all begins, just as Jesus had directed, when Philip goes to Samaria to preach the Gospel (Acts 8:5). Remember that Philip is a

"Hellenist," a man of Jewish descent, but who grew up outside the land of Israel. He speaks Greek and was raised in Hellenistic (Greek) culture. The "Hebrews," like Peter, James, and John, are "local" Jews, born and raised in Galilee or Judea. They speak Aramaic and prefer the Hebrew Old Testament. There are times when the "Hellenist" Jews and the "Hebrew" Jews don't get along. Yet it is the Hellenist Jews that preach the Gospel in Samaria.

Whichever Jew one was, Hellenist or Hebrew, did not erase the hatred between the Jews and the Samaritans. The Jews consider the Samaritans halfbreeds (because of intermarriage), and heretics, because they worship at their own temple on Mount Gerizim. Phillip, nonetheless, goes to the Samaritans and converts a number of them to Christ. Even Simon, a well-known magician who commands a large following, is amazed at the *(Continued on page 2)*

wonders and signs done in the name of Jesus. We are told that he "also believed" (Acts 8:13), is baptized, and begins to follow Phillip.

Then we are told something else that is very interesting. Acts 8:14-17 says this: "Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only

been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). Then Peter and John laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit." The effect was so dramatic that Simon tried to buy this power, the power of the Spirit, from the apostles, for which he is severely rebuked by Peter. The Spirit of God was not for sale to the highest bidder.

What is all this teaching us about the Holy Spirit? In particular, why had the Spirit not come upon the believers at Samaria? Did Philip not recite the proper Trinitarian formula? If there was a "formula" to recite it would have been just as magical as Simon believed it to be, and therefore something that could be owned. Perhaps those whom Philip led to Jesus experienced their new-found faith at an intellectual level, and only later did Peter and John open their hearts to the deeper life through the indwelling of the Spirit. Yet perhaps there is another reason.

When Peter brought the message of Pentecost to the Samaritans, they needed to recognize that the plan of salvation had come through the Jews. The Jews, however, had to also accept the truth that the same salvation they had been given had also been given to the Samaritans. In the midst of the great hatred between the two groups, God revealed to both that they could and would come together into one church.

The reception of the gift of the Spirit by the Samaritans through the Jews was a sign of potential healing between these age-old enemies. Later, in Acts 10, Peter would preach to the Gentiles, another age-old enemy of the Jews. They, too, would believe and immediately received the gift of the Spirit, and do so *without* the laying on of hands. Here, the Jews witness again that salvation has crossed ethnic and

> racial barriers. What is important to understand is that the Holy Spirit was the unifying factor that would bring Jews, Samaritans, and Gentiles into a new body!

The process of living into the Christian life is not the same for every person or group. It unfolds in a dynamic, often unforeseen process, rather than in a single,

isolated event or short-lived experience. The Spirit of God meets us where we are at and when we are ready. There are no formulas, recipes, or blueprints that God follows. The important question is: "Do I desire to have the Spirit of God disciple and empower me in my faith journey?" Now we are talking about stoking the fire in the oven!

William D. Hendricks, in *Exit Interviews* (Chicago: Moody, 1993), says "There is a splendid moment in the movie Jurassic Park, when world-class paleontologist Allen Grant, who has devoted his life to the study of dinosaurs, suddenly comes face-to-face with real live prehistoric creatures. He falls to the ground, dumbstruck. The reason is obvious.

It is one thing to piece together an informed but nonetheless imperfect image of dinosaurs by picking through fossils and bones. But to encounter an actual dinosaur - well, there (*Continued on page 10*)



Take the First Step

Whenever I am driving on the road and see those personalized plates, I am tempted to translate their meaning. I recently saw a message posted on a marquee sign that read *Take the first step and the next will appear*. This message seemed to resonate with me. I may not know what lies further down the path, but I will take each obvious first step and wait for the next step to appear, for I know that God will show me the next step.

Have you read the book *Cathedral: The Story of its Construction*? The author David Macaulay takes us back in time to the year 1252 in the fictional French village of Chutreaux where the people decide to build the "longest,

widest, highest and most beautiful cathedral in all of France". A time when an entire community, using ingeniously simple tools, could create something so strong and beautiful that it might stand forever. Imagine hoisting stone, timber, bronze bells, glass, sculptures, and carvings 160 feet or more above the ground. Building a cathedral whose vaulted spaces mimic the curve of the sky. David Macaulay brings the process to life, and in doing so he also animates a long-ago culture.

Some churches have a culture. Other churches are a culture. But culture exists in every church. Where culture is found, so are symbols. Some denominations have more formal symbols than others. Even in a church that intentionally minimizes symbols, they still exist. Choir robes, high-end technology, dim lights, the pulpit. Pastors who neglect symbols will not understand the church culture as well as they should. Pastors who take the time to understand symbols will best know how to reinforce the good elements of church culture.

Symbols maintain balance. Strip away all the symbols, and the church can potentially become flavorless. Churches with too many symbols become confusing bastions of rigid traditionalism. Symbols can become idols. Stained glass is beautiful. It tells a story, even the history of the church. But the glass itself can become more important than the story it tells. When the *what* of the church symbol becomes more important than the story it tells. They and arouse emotions more quickly than reasoning. Symbols elevate the "why" above the "what." Symbols reinforce culture and they can recast history.

Symbols in your church will act as lenses through which people understand the past. As you enter the East lobby of our Sanctuary, on the far East wall there are portraits of those pastors who have previously served at Velda Rose UMC. Each portrait represents an era of church history and its culture. These symbols help retell the church story and of course, we now know that a new portrait will be added to that wall.

The message posted on that marquee sign read *Take the first step and the next will appear*. Velda Rose UMC, we may not know what lies further down the path, but we will take each obvious first step and wait for the next step to appear, for I know that God will show us the next step. I hope that each step we take in life is taken with the comfort that God will lead us toward His plan. Even if we take the scenic route and not the most direct route, eventually we will reach His planned destination.


Graduation Sunday

VRUMC Food Pantry


The Food Pantry at Velda Rose UMC provides non-perishable food to those who come seeking assistance. If you can donate some of the following items, we would greatly appreciate it:


