Consistent with my tradition of bringing you a recipe—here is one of my (and my husband's) favorite soup recipes. This soup is good for inflammation and stomach problems. Enjoy!



Pear, Leek, & Fennel Soup

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons olive oil or avocado oil
- 2 medium leeks, white and light green parts only, sliced
- 1 large fennel bulb, sliced into ¼ inch slices (remove the stems and fronds)
- 1 tsp salt
- ¼ tsp black pepper
- 2 pears, peeled, cored, and diced
- 3 cups vegetable broth or water (or chicken stock)
- ½ cup raw cashews
- 2 cups packed raw spinach, washed
- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar

Optional Garnishes: green tabasco, fried onion, microgreens.

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Heat the oil in a large Dutch oven or soup pot.
- 2. Sauté the leeks and fennel bulb until starting to soften. About 5 minutes on medium high.
- 3. Add the pears, salt and pepper, and sauté for another 3-5 minutes.
- 4. Add the vegetable broth and cashews, bring to a boil. Turn down to a simmer and simmer for about 5 minutes.
- 5. Stir in the spinach and vinegar.
- 6. Process until smooth in a blender or use an immersion blender. You may have to process it in batches.
- 7. Serve with a couple of dashes of green tabasco sauce, fried onion, and microgreens.

Note: Leeks can hide a lot of dirt. Be sure to wash them well.

Summer Worship Series: The Path of the Disciple



The Path of the Disciple

A Summer Journey of Faith

Sundays at 9:30 am

THE STATED MISSION of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. This won't happen by accident; we don't fall into discipleship. It requires effort and intention and a disciple-making plan.

Pastor Ann is inviting you to join us on this discipleship journey in the first half of this long Ordinary Time season, beginning June 18, 2023. We will reflect on the joys and the struggles of following Jesus as we live out our faith in this confused and confusing world. And through it all, we offer our fully engaged worship to God as we gather week by week, confessing and renewing and recommitting ourselves to being disciples of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

We begin the Path of the Disciple by looking at "The Weight of the Call." A disciple is a follower. That means there must be someone to follow and that someone wants followers. Considering that, in the gospel accounts, Jesus said "follow me" more often than he said, "believe in me," we can be confident that there is a call to follow laid upon anyone and everyone who seeks to draw closer to Christ. It could even be argued that the whole of the life of faith is wrestling with that call to follow him.

Yet even a cursory reading of the gospels will reveal that Jesus never undersold this call. He never tried to convince us that following was an easy or a simple thing. There is effort here; there is sacrifice demanded; struggle and lifelong commitment are needed. So, we begin our summer worship

contemplation with consideration of the weight of the call. What is being asked of us, we who seek to be disciples of Jesus Christ?

Throughout this series, we listen again to the call of the whole people of faith, when God called Abraham to be the beginning – the genesis – of a new nation. Then we lay this ancient call alongside the words and deeds of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew as he confirms and enhances and redirects the call to be the church at work in the world. But here in part one, we are especially mindful of the radical nature of the call to leave everything behind and to live into a new reality, only then to discover the added responsibility of inviting the whole world to come to know the one we follow. We are to live as witnesses, not hidden away tending to our own souls, safe and secure behind the walls of our sanctuaries. We aren't called to safety, but to a risky and transforming faith that leans into the kin-dom of God daily. Jump in as we consider the weight of the call and the path of the disciple.

Retreat in Payson, Arizona

ON APRIL 29, I attended a retreat in Payson that was sponsored by the Desert Southwest United Women in Faith Conference. The retreat was

facilitated by Chris Spencer, who served for 6 years as president of Justice For Our Neighbors, an organization that receives monetary support from the Velda Rose United Women in Faith unit.

The retreat provided a time to gather and visit and get acquainted with women from other UWF units in the conference. It was held at the Payson United Methodist Church amid the tall pine trees. The theme of the retreat was "You Are Powerful." As the day progressed, Chris led us through different scripture readings, read insights from noted spiritual leaders, and followed it all with related questions that were discussed in smaller groups. Chris broke down the word "powerful" in the following way:

P – Prayerful in Peace. Scripture reading from Philippians 1:9

O – Open to others. Scripture reading from Matthew 25:35-40

W – Worthy of God's Word. Scripture reading from Ephesians 6:14-17

E – Equipped with Enthusiasm. Scripture reading from 2 Timothy 1:6-7

R – Ready to Respond. Scripture reading from 1 Samuel 3: 3-5

F – Filled with Fire. Scripture reading from Micah 3:8

U – Uplifted to Unleash. Scripture reading from Galatians 5:22-24

L – Loved by the Lord. Scripture reading from 2 Timothy 1:7

Thus, we began the morning with the scripture reading from Philippians 1:9: "This is my prayer that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth and insight."

And ended with the scripture reading from 2 Timothy 1:7: "For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline."

I encourage you to read and reflect on the other scripture readings listed above. The retreat offered participants a day of spiritual renewal, and I met many new friends, especially women from the Payson church. By the end of the retreat, my soul was uplifted!

Recycle—don't throw that away!

Recycle, cut down on landfills!

Recycle, save the planet!



Many of us are concerned about our planet and the amount of damage humans do and the pollution humans add to the earth. One way to help reduce pollution is to recycle. At Velda Rose UMC, we have good news and bad news on the recycling front. First the good news. Our Velda Rose United Men, Mission and Ministry (UMMM) are recycling aluminum soda cans. They have added shoots that make it much easier to drop off your cans. They earn money for every can we give them so save up all your soda cans, beer cans, or other beverage cans.

The money is used for mission. The UMMM also strip metals from old appliances and other broken or discarded items. The metals collected include copper and precious metals, and then the men sell the metal. They are already at almost their annual goal so they are doing wonderful work and working hard. Every bit of metal they strip out of old items is metal saved from a landfill, in addition to raising money to support mission.

The bad news. The company we used for our paper and cardboard recycling is going out of business. That means that we will not be able to recycle cardboard or paper for people and will have to pay to have our own paper recycled. The closest paper/cardboard recycling we know of it at Red Mountain Branch of the Mesa Library on Power Road.



Immigration and the Bible—October 22-27, 2023

"A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." So wrote Lao Tzu in the 6th century B.C.E. This is a journey we have seen many times on our TV's, as desperate migrants leave their homeland for safe haven elsewhere. Globally, some 200 million people are on the move. How do we understand this phenomenon, and what is ours to do.

For many American Christians, immigration requires another kind of a journey, not a physical one but a spiritual one. How do we move from ignorance to understanding, from judgment to empathy, from anger to compassion. When we look to scripture, what do we find, what do we remember. When we look to Jesus, and inside our own hearts, how do we respond as Christ-followers?

"A Mile in My Shoes: Immigration and the Bible" is a spiritual retreat and an immersion experience, an inward journey and a physical journey as we plunge into one of the most challenging issues of our day. Sponsored by the Desert Southwest Conference of the United Methodist Church, this event is open to lay and clergy leaders from any denomination who are committed to deepening their faith and engaging the world. The dates are October 22-27, 2023, at Redemptorist Renewal Center in Tucson (http://desertrenewal.org).

Adapting the Upper Room's highly regarded Academy for Spiritual Formation model, this event includes two full days of immersion, visiting migrant shelters and the border wall, listening to asylum seekers and activists, reflecting on what we have seen and heard. First though we'll study the scriptures with author and faculty presenter, Karen


Gonzalez. Karen's two books The God Who Sees: Immigrants the Bible, and the Journey to Belong (2019) and Beyond Welcome: Centering Immigrants in our Christian Response to Immigration(2022) tell her own compelling story, as she moved to the US from Guatemala with her family as a child. Encountering loss and alienation, prejudice and compassion, she found hope in scripture and in the church. Artfully and intimately woven into her narrative, her witness opens many places for dialogue and reorientation. Besides her own story, Karen includes insights from her work with immigrants in the nonprofit sector, offering a big picture perspective on immigration policy and practice that every reader will appreciate. Karen's presentations will bookend our gathering, and her presence will be felt throughout the week.

The cost of the retreat, including lodging, faculty presentations and transportation to the various venues is \$925 (for single accommodations) and \$825 (for shared accommodations). Scholarships are available. First time participants are particularly welcome. This is the 15th Five Day Academy for Spiritual Formation offered by the Desert Southwest Conference. The adaptation of the original model has been approved by The Upper Room's Academy Director, Johnny Sears. You may have heard at some point in the last few

months that the Desert Southwest Conference is taking a group of 124 youth and their chaperones to Youth23.

Youth 2023 is a gathering of United Methodist Youth that happens every four years. It's a time of worship, learning, fellowship, and service. I have had the privilege of attending the quadrennial youth event since I was a youth myself in 1995,1999, 2003, 2008, 2015, and 2019 as a youth, pastor, leader and a parent of young people, and am looking forward to attending again this year.

Story of Hope—VRUMC's Summer Blood Drive is June 21

AFTER MONTHS OF vague symptoms and emergency room visits, 6-year-old Kinzie Frey was diagnosed with stage 4, high-risk neuroblastoma, a type of cancer that can grow into

tumors. Her tumor was collectively the size of a mini basketball, originating on her right adrenal gland and was tangled throughout her abdomen, wrapping around veins, arteries and organs from her heart to her pelvis. Kinzie's doctor immediately began an aggressive treatment protocol to fight the cancer and prevent it from returning. After her second round of chemo, she had a procedure to remove some of her stem cells. The cells were preserved and given back to her during two stem cell transplants. Each transplant required a month in the hospital and strict precautions that prevented her from returning to school or going to public places. Kinzie developed a late complication from the stem cell transplant that caused her body to break down blood cells at an alarming rate and required numerous blood and platelet transfusions. Over 18 months, Kinzie received 46 red blood cell transfusions and 72 platelet transfusions. Her mother, Holly Bosse, says, "If it weren't for the generosity of blood donors, Kinzie wouldn't be here with us today. Those blood donations aren't only a gift to Kinzie but to our family, friends and supporters.

"Hosting a blood drive coincides with Velda Rose UMC's core values of giving back to the community," said Pastor Ann. "With a simple blood donation, we have the ability to help save the life of someone who could be a coworker, loved one or neighbor."

Blood is routinely transfused to patients with cancer and other diseases, premature babies, organ transplant recipients and trauma victims, according to the Red Cross.

"The short amount of time it takes to donate can mean a lifetime to a patient with a serious medical condition. We urge eligible donors to join us in the selfless act of giving blood."

Donors of all blood types are needed, especially those with types O negative, B negative and A negative. According to the Red Cross, type O negative is the universal blood type that can be safely transfused to anyone, and is often used to treat trauma patients.
