## Embracing Imperfection By Rev. Ann Lyter

DECADES AGO I TOOK an 8-week pencil drawing class, not drawing pencils, but drawing with pencils. I learned all about the scale for pencils that indicate how hard or soft the graphite is-soft pencils, like a 4B, for darker shading and smudging, hard pencils like a 2H for finer lines, details, and lighter shading. I did my exercises and filled my sketch book with my assignments. Toward the end of the class, about week 7 as I remember, the instructor was walking around the room, looking at everyone's artwork, praising their efforts, and giving them encouragement. I was proud of my work. The egg on the white cloth looked like an egg! And the drawing of my living room ottoman liked exactly like the ottoman, at least to my eye. As she came to my station, there was an awkward silence. As the silence grew, I sensed that she was struggling to find something positive to say. Finally, she said, "it's very ... geometric." And I knew then that I might be able to graph out a math problem. or chart a furniture layout, but I did not have the eye or the hands of a true artist.

It turns out that I'm not perfect after all. I hope that doesn't disappoint anyone. There are some things I cannot do, drawing is just one of them. But I'm not the only one. I will even go so far as to say that none of us are perfect, and not just in the "all-have-sinned-and -fallen-short" sense found in Romans. The nature of humanity is imperfection, which is really just diversity. I may not be able to draw, but others can. Perfection, after all, is a judgment and often based on an aesthetic that changes over time. Am I too short? Too tall? Too heavy? Too skinny? Too dark? Too pale? Too athletic? Too sedentary? Too abrupt? Not plainspeaking? For which decade and which culture? Because what is seen as perfect or even preferred, changes over time and across cultures. What we often call flaws or imperfections are the unique way God created us.


In the tapestry of human existence, imperfection weaves its threads intricately, shaping the very fabric of our lives. Yet, within the depths of our flaws lies an invitation – an invitation to embrace imperfection as a sacred journey towards wholeness and grace. Scripture abounds with narratives of imperfect individuals whom God used mightily despite, and sometimes because of, their flaws. Consider the story of Moses, a hesitant and stuttering leader chosen by God to deliver His people from bondage. Peter's narrative unfolds as a testament to the reality that faith is not a linear progression but rather a dynamic journey marked by highs and lows, victories and setbacks. Like many of us, Peter's path is far from polished or perfect.

In our exploration of Peter's faith journey, we are reminded of the profound truth that God meets us in the midst of our imperfections. Just as Peter's story is characterized by a mixture of strengths and weaknesses, triumphs and failures, so too are our own lives marked by a similar dichotomy. And yet, it is precisely within our imperfections that the grace and love of God shine most brightly.

Brené Brown, a leading voice on vulnerability and courage, emphasizes that it is through our vulnerability and imperfection that we find true connection with others and with God. She writes, "Imperfections are not inadequacies; they are reminders that we're all in this together."

Real-life examples abound of individuals who have embraced their imperfections and found profound purpose and meaning in doing so. Consider the story of Henri Nouwen, a renowned spiritual writer who struggled deeply with feelings of inadequacy and selfdoubt. Yet, through his vulnerability and openness about his struggles, Nouwen's words continue to inspire and uplift countless souls around the world.

In our own lives, embracing imperfection invites us into a deeper understanding of God's grace and love. It reminds us that we are not defined by our flaws, but rather by the boundless love of a God who sees us as beloved and worthy. As we journey through Lent towards Easter, let us release the burden of perfectionism and instead embrace the beauty of our imperfect selves. For it is through our imperfections that God's grace shines most brightly, transforming our weaknesses into avenues of divine glory and grace.



## Lent and Easter Worship Series

THIS LENT, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' most famous disciples. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter, we often see ourselves. By following Peter's journey, we watch the story of Jesus unfold through the eyes of a very normal human trying to figure it all out—just like us.

In addition to worship, our focus on Peter and his

wandering heart (and ours) is also the focus for our Wednesday on-line meditations using the spiritual practice of *visio divina* or sacred seeing. And our Wednesday afternoon study also focuses on Peter, using Adam Hamilton's book *Simon Peter*.

# **General Conference News**

GENERAL CONFERENCE BRINGS TOGETHER lay and clergy delegates from four continents whose decisions will affect how millions of United Methodists do church for years to come. Think of the two-week gathering as a combination of a United Nations General Assembly, a U.S. congressional session and a time of rousing Christian worship. The coming General Conference is scheduled for April 23-May 3 in Charlotte, North Carolina. Usually scheduled every four years, the last regular session was in May 2016 — nearly eight years ago—because of COVID.

General Conference is the denomination's highest legislative body. The lawmaking assembly deals with matters as varied as the denomination's budget, social teachings, ecumenical relations and international structure. All matters under consideration are available online through DailyChristianAdvocate.org, at a cost of \$49.99 for a public account. Be forewarned, there are three volumes plus a supplement.

As the date for General Conference approaches, delegates around the globe are raising alarms that they lack details about the long-delayed legislative assembly. These concerns range from lack of details about travel and hotel arrangements for US delegates to the even more serious concern that some delegates outside the U.S. have not yet received an invitation letter — the crucial first step to obtaining a visa to travel to General Conference.

General Conference organizers told United Methodist News that they plan to communicate many of those details by early March.

Good News and the Wesleyan Covenant Association plan to be a lobbying presence at General Conference, despite having been part of forming the Global Methodist Church and then actively encouraged congregations to leave The UMC and join the Global Methodist Church. These lobbying bodies are clearly aligned with that new, breakaway denomination. Their expressed purpose now is to lobby "for exit paths for congregations and annual conferences." This does not sit well with delegates loyal to The UMC who seek to focus on, "charting our path forward to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world," as expressed by Rev. Stan Copeland, a North Texas Conference delegate.



relationship with God. By drawing closer to one another and our world, we draw closer to the kin -dom.



## **VRUMC Food Pantry News**

**2023'S NUMBERS ARE IN:** Total donations given directly to the Velda Rose UMC Food Pantry (seasonal special offerings included) totaled approximately \$20,400. The total amount spent by the VRUMC Food Pantry for food and materials in 2023 was approximately \$23,700.

As shared in the January 2024 Vision newsletter, between 1/5 and 12/28/2023, the VRUMC Food Pantry reached 2,038 individuals and distributed 902 food boxes (food and individual totals for houseless emergency bags not included).

According to the USDA's Economic Research Service, "In 2024, all food prices are predicted to increase 2.9 percent, with a prediction interval of 0.5 to 5.3 percent. Food-at-home prices are predicted to increase 1.6 percent, with a prediction interval of -1.8 to 5.3 percent, and food-away-from-home prices are predicted to increase 5.0 percent, with a prediction interval of 3.7 to 6.3 percent."

Though 2021 and 2022 saw the highest inflation in recent years, the continual increase of food prices and living costs will likely result in even more friends and neighbors seeking assistance from our Food Pantry in 2024.

Donations are received at the Food Pantry Mondays and Thursdays from 9:30 to 11:30 am, in the church office M - TH from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm, or Sundays, in the shopping carts at the front of the Sanctuary.

## **Lenten and Easter Offering**

Ask people what ministry at Velda Rose UMC provides the most practical help and has the power to change lives, and many will say the same thing, the Food Pantry. Offering food to our neighbors facing food insecurity, the Food Pantry is a vital safety net for many who can find no other help. For too many retirees in Mesa, navigating life's uncertainties on a fixed income can be daunting, and young family too often struggle, but within the walls of this pantry, they find solace, support, and sustenance.

As January drew to a close, the sobering reality was the demands placed upon the food pantry have surpassed the resources available. The simple truth is, we spent more than was donated. And this imbalance was not helped by the break-in. While the good people of Velda Rose UMC have always been generous to the Food Pantry, the need has never been greater than now.

As Christians we have a sacred call to alleviate suffering. Accordingly, I have chosen the Food Pantry as our mission focus Lent and Easter. In the spirit of Lent – a season of reflection, repentance, and sacrificial giving – I am asking the congregation to make our Food Pantry a special focus for donations of food and money. Similarly, the Easter giving letter will focus on the Food Pantry and the need for ongoing support.

DURING THE MOST RECENT Sessions meeting (planning body for Annual Conference), members agreed that this year's mission project would focus on support for churches engaged in asylum and border mission. In the coming weeks we will announce items that may be donated to one or two organizations who work in this same area.

In mid-May of 2023, a fund was established to help local churches doing direct service with asylum seekers and immigrants. Entitled Asylum Aid and Border Ministries, this fund supports churches through an application process.

We do not publicize the location of these churches to the general public because of the possibility of threats to those locations. Last year an individual appeared at one of the sites with an AR-15 rifle. This is not uncommon for the ecumenical churches serving asylum seekers throughout the state.

Partner district churches have helped the sites by donating clothing, transportation, and food. The connectional system showing her best!

Asylum seekers come from all over the world – Central America, yes – but so many more places such as India, Angola, Peru, and China – just to name a few. If you follow international news, it is not difficult to understand why people have left their home countries. Leaving ... home. Never an easy decision and always painful. Not just a move from house to house, but leaving your home country – all that you have known, and traveling to the unknown. Can you imagine moving your own self or family under those circumstances?

Part of the application process includes the question, "Do you have any specific prayer requests for our selection team?" Many times, those requests include "safety for our traveling families" and "strength and safety for our staff and volunteers." I think each of us would understand, even assume, prayers for the safety of the families who are traveling. But safety – safety– for church staff and volunteers...something to contemplate.

We have witnessed the repeated rise and fall of entry numbers. Sometimes, the numbers have been lower. Many times, as you know from news reports, people coming into our country seeking safety are astoundingly high. The financial need for our churches engaged in this work is great. Their call to help the vulnerable is even greater.

Our prayer is that our always generous Conference churches will respond.

In the coming months, we will publish first-hand accounts from some of the churches engaged in this mission. I am confident your hearts will be moved.

As always, your ongoing prayer is the greatest gift of all.



IN CELEBRATION OF Velda Rose UMC's 60th anniversary this year, every month we will be sharing history from the archives in *The Vision* newsletter.

**Q:** What year was this written in VRUMC's *The Messenger* newsletter?

"We have been talking about it forever, and we have been putting up with the congestion in the meantime, but can you believe this? The City of Mesa has finally approved this project! Specifically, it provides for a median cut-through on Main Street which will allow eastbound traffic to turn into our vacant property, which will lead to a driveway connected to both our back or north parking area and a separate driveway connecting with the north side of our medical building property."

**A (and some facts!):** March 2002. The article was written by Marv Harmsen. After various bids, the "driveway/median cut-through project"

finally began. Equipment arrived in August, and per Marv's September 2002 newsletter article, "We now have an asphalt driveway through the vacant property. Also in place is a deceleration lane allowing westbound



traffic to enter our new driveway... The curbing has been removed in the median, all plants have been cleared and initial PVC pipe laid for new landscaping and one of the streetlights needs to be removed. Barring further rain delays, we can expect the project to be complete by the end of next month!"

The October 2002 newsletter announced that the new driveway and median cut-through was complete.

Not only do forests act as a carbon sink but they also provide vital habitat for animals and
