Food for the Body and Soul: Recognizing People in Need By Pastor Ann

As we approach Mother's Day, I can't help but think about my mother and that it was a year ago that my siblings and I were so worried because Mom had fallen and then suffered a cascade of medical problems. Thoughts of Mother's Day were overwhelmed by thoughts of whether my mother would be alive on Mother's Day. Thankfully, this year we are all in a better place on that score.

But it does make me think about caring for our mothers and how to provide support and care for people, especially older people, who live alone. As a community of faith, we are to care for each other. Scripture says we are to care for the "widows and orphans." As early as the book of Exodus, scripture teaches that God takes particular notice of widows, and that God will denounce anyone who mistreats them. Scripture calls for Jews to allow widows to reap in their fields and to share in the tithes and meals at public festivals (Deuteronomy 14:28-29), and mandated support for widows, as well as for the fatherless and the immigrant, by giving food and clothing (Deuteronomy 10:18).

In the earliest years of the Christian church, even before believers were called Christians, the community shared their resources so that none, including the widows, would go without. (Acts 2:44-45; 4:32) But what may be the earliest record of church conflict arose when Hellenists complained that their widows were not being treated as well as Jewish widows. (Acts 6:1) Balancing caring for others and preserving limited resources has always been a struggle. We can also see the care for widows in Paul's letter to Timothy when he addresses the church in Ephesus about the need to care for those in the community who are most in need. (1 Timothy 5:3-16) More importantly, Jesus calls on us to care for each other in the new commandment that he gave at the last supper: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have

love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

I am touched by the many people at Velda Rose UMC who are stepping up to help others in the congregation and the community. This month I want to highlight and thank a few of our members who are helping our congregation. Rhonda Montgomery who has offered her expertise on being a caregiver to help others who are in the position of caregiver. Rev. Gary McDonough who has offered his expertise in the field of grieving and offered a grief class. Connie

Zimmerman who is learning about visitation ministry and bringing caring to church members. All three of these ministries are especially helpful to seniors who often live alone or who end up living alone. Caring for this population is particularly important.

Here are some questions we can all ponder: How can we better care for each other? Is there something you need? Is there something you have to offer that could help others? As the Planning Team works on defining and discerning ministries that help Velda Rose UMC fulfill its mission and purpose, your suggestions are welcome and helpful. One of the things I did to help care for my mother was to make up a freezer full of meals that she could easily heat up. This reduced the burden of planning and shopping and cooking every night. My recipe this month is one that she found particularly tasty. I made it up and placed it in single-serving microwavable freezer containers available through Amazon (and probably Walmart). Enjoy! Chicken Broccoli Rice Casserole



20 servings



INGREDIENTS

10 cups of cooked rice

- 4 cups of cooked chicken, chopped or shredded (rotisserie chicken is a time saver)
- 4 cups broccoli, lightly steamed and chopped (frozen broccoli makes this really fast)
- 4 cups of shredded cheddar cheese (save time by buying shredded cheese, if you prefer a different kind of cheese, you can substitute it) 4 cans cream of soup (14 oz. size) (you will get the best flavor if you mix varieties. Suggestions include mushroom, chicken, celery, or mushroom with roasted garlic. Use vour favorite kinds. You can also lower the sodium by using low sodium varieties)

1 tsp salt

½ tsp pepper

DIRECTIONS

Preparation:

In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients and mix well.

Divide mixture into desired serving sizes in freezer bags or containers. Label, seal and freeze.

Cooking Instructions:

For family serving sizes (1/4 of the recipe): Thaw the mixture overnight. Place in a 9 X 13" casserole dish. You can add additional cheese on top, if desired. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes or until bubbly.

For individual servings using microwavable containers: There is no need to thaw. Simply remove the top and microwave for 5 minutes on full power. Stir. Microwave for an additional 3-5 minutes, depending on the power of your microwave, or until the desired temperature is reached and the mixture is bubbly.

Note: You can use this same method with shredded pork and hash browns and peppers with cheese soup and cream of bacon for a completely different meal. Or try cooked ground or shredded beef with mixed vegetables and cream of potato and cream of mushroom for a casserole version of pot roast. All Clean Pastor Daniel

Many churches use candles in worship. Some churches today are adopting an ancient usage of a very large candle that symbolizes both the pillar of fire that led Israel by night and the risen Lord who stands among us at Easter. This large candle sits in a tall (usually 48 inches) stand, and it bears a light high for all the people to see as they sing, "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" This candle is called the paschal candle. "Pasch" comes from the Hebrew word "pesah," meaning deliverance or Passover -- thus connecting the Resurrection to the Exodus.

Some churches practice lighting the paschal candle outside and then will process into the church. The candle remains lighted for all services during the Great Fifty Days — Easter through Pentecost. It serves as a reminder of our Lord's Resurrection victory over the darkness of sin,

death and the grave. Sometimes, the paschal candle is lighted at baptisms, as a strong reminder of our connection to Christ's death and resurrection.

In our baptism, we are connected with Christ's death. Not only is our sinful guilt washed away in Jesus' Blood, but also the Old Adam, the sinful nature we were conceived and born with, is drowned, killed, and buried with Christ along with its mastery over us. However, in that Blessed Sacrament, God has acted to make the dead, alive. Pastor Klemet Preus in his book "The Fire and the Staff" shares an experience he had as he was preparing a family to baptize their child. The young couple had three children, the youngest about a month old. A month earlier, he had visited them in their home to review what the church teaches about Baptism. Little Johnny, about 4 years old, had listened with focused attention as the pastor was speaking.

When the big day arrived, everyone was excited and joyful. The baby was dressed in a gorgeous and intricate gown, the same worn by her mother and

grandmother. Just before the service began, Pastor Klemet was asked, "Would it be okay if Johnny comes up to the font as well? He probably won't behave in the pew."

"Of course," replied the Pastor, "that way he can see exactly what is happening."

The family beamed their pleasure. "Oh, that would be so nice."

Dad held Lil' Johnny, who did appear to be interested in the baptism, and seemed to squirm slightly less

than usual. When the family returned to their pew, Pastor Klemet was pleased—both at the Baptism, and at Johnny's uncharacteristically good behavior. Perhaps, he thought, witnessing his sister's Holy Baptism is a positive thing for Johnny.

Then it happened. Halfway

back to their pew, Dad let Johnny walk. The agile little elf quickly seized his opportunity and escaped. Johnny was standing in front of the altar, facing the congregation. Pastor Klemet gasped. Mom and Dad gasped. The congregation smiled, knowing that something was about to happen. Then Johnny spoke.

In his book, Pastor Klemet said the following: It was one of those short, brilliant, and completely orthodox statements that indicates a life in the ministry. "All clean!" he shouted and summarily returned to his pew. The congregation smiled again. ... I realized that Johnny had captured the purpose and meaning of Baptism perfectly and precisely. He had preached a better sermon that day than I had. I think his sermon was just as clear and to the point, "All clean!"

In Baptism God said, "All clean." In the face of satan's attacks and accusations, gaze upon the lit candles before you this Easter season and be reminded that you have been connected to Christ's death and resurrection, that you are "all clean"!

EMERGE Worship Series Continues in May

OUR EMERGE WORSHIP SERIES CONTINUES through May. We are living in a time of great change, one might even say, of metamorphosis. We're all human, after all, and transformation is inevitable. The seemingly tried and

true practices we have known don't work anymore. The familiar is often being covered with the silk threads of a cocoon in which we will inevitably transform. It is an experience of liminality, which comes with a certain amount of pain as we let go of our illusions of



permanence. We can see this moment as the iconic symbol of death and resurrection that butterfly metaphors tend toward, but we can also marvel at the proof that life is simply progressing especially because we are living this great change.

Butterflies are a long-standing symbol of resurrection and our theme image for this series. This series started with the caterpillar and chrysalis — the beginning of the journey of transformation — and affirmed the

darkness as good for birthing new things. Already within a caterpillar are amazing groupings of dormant cells that have all the information needed to move ahead and form and perform as a beautiful butterfly. The DNA for change and for whatever-isnext is already within us, gifted by

our Creator. This is the good news we will proclaim this season.

improved life for women, children and youth around the world. Dawn Armstrong, chair of the Legacy Steering Committee of the Board of Directors, says on page 17 of the



March/April 2023 issue of Response Magazine, "When you make a gift to the Legacy Fund, you pool your resources together with hundreds of other women to create a powerful investment. This investment will continue to pay dividends in perpetuity, ensuring that there is a permanent source of income available to accomplish the vital work of United Women in Faith for many years to come."

www.uwfaith.org. One such article was written by Emily Jones, the executive for racial justice at United



Women in Faith. She leads UWF's campaign to interrupt the school-to-prison

pipeline. In an article entitled "What Black History Means to Me as a White Woman," Emily writes that most of our schools didn't teach us much, if anything, about women's stories. "We know little to nothing about Fannie Lou Hamer and Ella Baker, about Mary McLeod Bethune and Ida B. Wells, about Sojourner Truth and Harriet Tubman. We were not taught about the many lasting fruits of African American struggles which have benefitted us all, including free public schools in the South instituted by Black state legislators of the Reconstruction Period, and birthright citizenship and "equal protection under the law" secured in the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, another fruit of the Reconstruction Era after the Civil War. The stories of these women, when we learn them, offer crucial inspiration and clarifying instruction for our living today." Emily reminds us that when we know where we've come from, we are better able to act faithfully in the present and reach toward a more just future, together. I recommend you take a moment to browse the UWF website to find other thought-provoking articles.

The UMMM are now collecting aluminum drinking cans to be recycled. This is good for our


environment and also will help us with income for our missions and projects. You can drop your cans off at the pods on the east end of the mission building. There are slots there to place them in. All cans are appreciated.

Ukraine UMC Support—By Billie Fidlin

"WAR-TORN" DESCRIBED Ukraine. While heartbreaking for all concerned, I think about the children involved. I have two adult sons of my own, and two granddaughters. To imagine – though I know in my heart I truly can't imagine because war is foreign to our shores – children having to live through this – if they live at all – my heart breaks. But we, here in the United States, here in our Conference – we do need to imagine. We do need to take all of this to heart because as people of faith we are called to care for our sisters and brothers, both near and far. But... the children.

UNICEF has been looking into the matter of missing Ukrainian children with great intention. "So far, 465 Ukrainian children have been killed during the war and approximately 14,000 more have been kidnapped and deported to Russia" – this according to Ukrainian officials. Of that 14,000, only 125 (approximate estimate) have been sent back to Ukraine. I take those numbers in. What if it was my granddaughter? Or yours. (https://www.ebu.ch/news/2023/02/where-are-the-missing-children-of-ukraine)

United Methodist funding will move through UMCOR – the United Methodist Committee on Relief – to be used for food, clothing, shelter and later economic rebuild. May we give from the heart. "Surely one does not turn against the needy, when in disaster they cry for help." Job 30:24

RIP Medical Debt

On April 16th, CBS Sunday Morning ran an excellent piece on RIP Medical Debt. As their intro narrative states:

"At any time, one in five American households bears medical debt, the cause in a majority of U.S. bankruptcies. Since 2014, the charity RIP Medical Debt has abolished more than \$8.5 billion worth of medical bills for five million Americans, by buying up delinquent medical debt at pennies on the dollar, just as debt collectors do, and abolishing it. Correspondent Martha Teichner

talks with the co-founder and president of RIP Medical Debt, and with a Georgia preschool teacher whose \$1,500 medical debt, that had dogged her for years, was suddenly erased."

This four-minute video on the CBS website (https://www.cbsnews.com/video/rip-medical-debt-abolishing-crippling-health-care-debts/) gives an excellent overview of how the program works.

Turkey & Syria Earthquake Relief (as edited and updated by Pastor Ann)

Since February 6th, the day of the first earthquake to strike Turkey and neighboring Syria, national and international news organizations have carried stories of the total devastation and overwhelming numbers of lives lost. Complete cities were leveled, with nothing left. A second series of earthquakes hit on February 20th and as of March 1, there were more than 11,000 aftershocks. The earthquakes and underlying vulnerabilities resulted in the confirmed deaths of at least 56,000 people in Turkey and Syria, including aid workers, and many more likely still buried. Over 230,000 buildings were damaged or destroyed in Turkey, with thousands more damaged in Syria. The International Organization for Migration reports that 3 million people have been displaced by the earthquakes in Turkey. As of April 20, 1.6 million people in Turkey continued to live in informal settlements. UMCOR has provided financial assistance since day one; volunteers from all over the world have traveled to help dig through the rubble, stone by stone. Miracles have occurred finding some people alive, more than 200 hours after that first quake.

him practicing the organ during the week as well as very early on Sunday mornings. He is an accomplished organist and pianist. It makes him happy to know that his music affects people's lives.


