Food for the Body & Soul: Thanksgiving

IT IS COMMON TO FOCUS on thankfulness as we come into November and look toward the Thanksgiving holiday. I often see people undertake the spiritual discipline of naming something they are thankful for and posting it to Facebook on a daily basis, often with the notation #thankful. So this is a good time to ask, what are you thankful for?

Turn it around pastor, you say? What am I thankful for? I am thankful for family, for my husband and my daughters who support me and love me and accept me for who I am. I am thankful for my parents who raised us in love and stability and for my mom who is still with



us. I am thankful for being healthy and healthier than I used to be. I'm thankful for my calling and purpose in life and for this community to serve. Truly, my blessings overflow.

So often, we say things like, "I am blessed," or "I am thankful," to mean that we are happy and that life is going well. But, scripture calls on us to be thankful in all circumstances. 1 Thessalonians 5:18. And Jesus told us that blessings come in circumstances that are not always happy and easy. "Blessed are the poor in spirit,...Blessed are those who mourn,...Blessed are the meek,... Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness." (Matthew 5:3, 4, 5, 10) So gratitude is not just about knowing or acknowledging when life is good.

Thankfulness is more than just a good spiritual practice or something to do every November. I find it remarkable how often something that scripture asks us to do as a spiritual practice has physical and mental benefits beyond religion—like the health benefits we see if we honor the Sabbath and have a day of rest. Gratitude is more

than spiritual—it actually helps us. As reported by Harvard Med School, "gratitude is strongly and consistently associated with greater happiness. Gratitude helps people feel more positive emotions, relish good experiences, improve their health, deal with adversity, and build strong relationships." Psychology

Today reports seven distinct benefits from practicing gratitude: 1. opens the door to better relationships; 2. improves physical health; 3. improves psychological health; 4. enhances empathy and reduces aggression; 5. improves sleep, if you take time before bed to keep a gratitude journal or otherwise focus on what you are grateful for; 6. improves self-esteem; and 7. improves mental strength, including an improvement in overcoming trauma.

With this in mind, I am thankful for challenge and hardship, because out of those things come possibility and growth. It is after pruning that plants often have their greatest growth, and out of trials that we learn to be strong. One of the things I am thankful for is the tradition of gathering as (continued on page 2)

Potato Stuffing

Ingredients

- ¾ C finely chopped celery
- ½ C boiling water
- ½ tsp salt
- ¼ tsp black pepper
- 1 Tbsp chopped parsley
- 2 C boiled potatoes, mashed (see note)
- 2 eggs
- 2 C dried breadcrumbs
- Broth to moisten

Directions

Combine all ingredients
 except broth. Add broth
 until stuffing is desired
 texture. If baking in a
 casserole, consistency
 should be approximately
 that of mashed potatoes.
 If stuffing in the bird,
 leave the stuffing a little
 stiffer because it was gain
 moisture during cooking.
 Bake a covered casserole
 in a 350-degree oven for
 35 minutes or until fully
 heated through.

NOTE: THE POTATOES ARE PLAIN, WITHOUT ADDED BUTTER, MILK, OR CREAM.

IF YOU ARE USING LEFT-OVER MASHED POTATO, YOU MAY NEED TO ADD LESS

BROTH OR MORE BREADCRUMBS TO AVOID THE STUFFING BEING TOO SOFT.

An Inspirational Lighthouse Story

WE ALL HAVE A CHOICE TO MAKE with regards to our work of discipleship. At times, we allow our lives to become comfortable and we may find ourselves content with that. That is, until the Holy Spirit gradually nudges us to reflect and examine ourselves. To rekindle our beacon of hope for one another. The following is a short vesper or devotional on keeping your light burning for Christ. It uses the lighthouse as an example. I hope and pray that we find ourselves lighting and saving the path of others both in our words and deeds.

Many years ago there was a little village on a rocky seacoast, where storms often battered and seas were ever treacherous. Many ships were driven onto the rocks by the storms, and the lives of many sailors were lost because of the raging seas. One day the people decided among themselves that they should establish a lighthouse and life saving station on a little peninsula on the coast, to warn ships away from the rocks and to save the lives of those who were cast into the icy waters. They approached the government and began to secure the necessary funds for their project. Soon they set forth and built a tower, and set a beacon in it; they organized a lookout system; and they bought boats and learned how to man them; and soon they were in business. The business of saving lives! Soon the effects of what they were doing became known far and wide. Fewer ships went on the rocks; and when such a tragedy did occur, and the alarm was sounded, the people risked their own lives to rescue those who had been cast into the raging, icy waters. Within a

few short years, people came from great distance to study their lighthouse, and to use it as a model.

One day someone suggested that, since they spent so much time at the lighthouse that they should gather there occasionally and enjoy good fellowship. Soon they began to get together (at first infrequently, and then more often) at the lighthouse. In fact, many people began to build their homes near the lighthouse. Then when the lookout sounded the alarm, they were ready to go out. Next, it was decided that if they were going to spend so much time there, they'll make the place more comfortable. So arrangements were made to heat the lighthouse. The gray walls were painted a brilliant white. Some of the walls were paneled; rugs were put on the floors to disguise the bare concrete; a fine kitchen was installed with a handsome stove; and generally speaking the lighthouse became a nice place to spend your time waiting for the alarm to be sounded. The lighthouse soon became the center of life in the little town that grew up around it. One night, a fierce storm blew in and many ships were tossed on the jagged rocks, and the men at the lighthouse spent long hours picking sailors from the bitter cold icy waters and taking them to the lighthouse, where they were fed and provided with dry clothing. After the storm subsided and the sailors had all left the lighthouse, there were some men who were angry. It seems the storm had made them leave the comfort of the lighthouse, and go out into the wet, dangerous seas; and they got cold; very cold. The sailors, when they were delivered to the lighthouse, soiled the carpets. The kitchen was a mess, not to mention the stove. After a brief meeting it was first decided that sailors, when they were brought to the lighthouse, should be taken to the basement, not to the nice upper areas.

Sometime later, another storm blew in; and about one half of the men went out in the boats, and again picked sailors from the frigid waters. This time the ship, which had broken apart on the rocks, was from another nation; and the men (continued on page 9)



There will be no class on 11/23.



An article on page 38 of the Response Magazine reports on a town hall meeting held at the United Women in Faith Assembly 2022. Panelists discussed how climate justice is needed when public policies are adopted to mitigate the effects of climate change. Panelist Adrienne Rice said that "Climate justice addresses who will be able to recover and rebuild." Often policy decisions put unequal stresses on marginalized communities. Grace Musuka, a Zimbabwe missionary, said the issues of climate change fall heaviest on women and girls as extreme heat waves, flooding in some areas and droughts in others affect the food supply and women's ability to feed their families. Climate change affects everyone. Climate justice ensures that all people, no matter where they live, have a voice when decisions are made to address climate change.

FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS: HOPE AND FORGIVENESS AFTER THE CHARLESTON MASSACRE by Sharon Risher, with Sherri Wood Emmons

This is a true story of a minister Sharon Risher plunged into the depths of mourning. She lost her mother and two

cousins during the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church massacre. She had to choose between wallowing in the pain of losing family and friends to the white supremacist or choosing the path of forgiveness and hope—forgiving the convicted killer for his crime. This book is from the Social Action Category first suggested for the UWF Reading Program in 2019.

By the end of November, those readers completing 5 books in five different categories must submit on the reporting form those books read to Mary Killgrove, our elected Program Resources Chair or to their Circle Chairs. Those readers submitting paperwork will receive a certificate in January 2023 and be recognized in the February Vision.

Mission Highlight: The Inn Project of Southern Arizona



VELDA ROSE UMC'S UNITED WOMEN OF FAITH support many local Methodist-related organizations. One such organization is The Inn of Southern Arizona.

THE STORY OF THE INN: Ordinary people responded to an extraordinary need in December 2016. Thousands of asylum seekers at the AZ border had no safe place after release from detention by Immigration Customs Enforcement (I.C.E.). The Desert Southwest Conference of the United Methodist Church pledged to help. A courageous church opened its doors, volunteers pitched in, and The Inn began. Unlike the experience of Mary and Joseph who had been turned away at an inn, those needing rest and understanding would be welcome here.

We receive families who have gone through U.S. Customs and Border Protection (C.B.P.), or I.C.E., and are released to continue the immigration process. Our volunteers provide temporary shelter, hospitality, food, clothing, showers, and compassion for these vulnerable families, giving them a safe place to stay while they transition to the next part of their journey. Since its beginnings in December of 2016, The Inn has served more than 14,081 people. In 2019, on average we sheltered 234 people, served 1,1423 meals, and prepared 581 meals to-go every month.

In the fall 2022 newsletter, Director Gretchen Lopez shared: "...The Inn of Southern Arizona is now officially a sub-awardee of Pima County and has moved to a new hotel location, operating 40 rooms. This has afforded more opportunities for support and better access to FEMA funding. When families and guests arrive, they are provided hygiene kits, snack bags, and room assignments. Guests can come to our office for other needed items such and clothing and items for their children. This is a wonderful time for volunteers to provide support and have time with the guests. Meals are delivered to guests' rooms three times daily."

who manned her spoke another language, and even worse were of a different color. After this storm, a few

more men joined those who refused to enter the sea. They decided that men like these did not belong in the lighthouse at all; some said they felt that the lighthouses' job was not supposed to be saving sailors from other lands, because they were so much

different. Finally, it was decided that the beacon would be kept lit, but the rescue work would be discontinued. However, a small group disagreed and went down the coast, a short distance, and started a new lighthouse. This small group decided that they should establish the biggest life saving station on the little peninsula, and so they did. Every day they warned ships and sometimes attempted to save lives from the icy water. Fame of the new lighthouse grew and the old lighthouse eventually turned out its beacon. Some people say the beacon can still be seen today in you and I. Oh yes, they also say the small groups running the new lighthouse were those once rescued from the raging seas.

United Women in Faith Christmas Stocking Project






