# Food for the Body and Soul: Holy Ground By Pastor Ann

"I worship in God's cathedral."

"I find God outside when I'm \_\_\_\_\_ (skiing, biking, hiking, etc.), not in church."

How many times have I heard this kind of thing?

Often.

And usually in response to my asking someone if they go to church or when I invite them to join in worship. And I can admit that my general response (internally, never



said out loud) is that this is a cop-out for people who don't want to go to church. But that's probably my own bias as the pastor of a brick-and-mortar church.

After all, scripture is full of people, patriarchs and matriarchs and saints of all sorts, who find God or experience God in nature: Noah in the flood; Haggar at the spring; Moses and the burning bush; Moses on Mt. Sinai, the Israelites in the wilderness when God provided a cloud by day and a pillar of fire at night for guidance, and manna and quail for food, Elijah in the cave when God came in the silence, just to name a few. Even Jesus went *outside* when he wanted to be with God, whether it was to a mountain to be alone or the garden of Gethsemane to pray with his disciples as witnesses (albeit sleepy ones). And it was in Jesus' interaction with nature in calming the storm that caused his disciples to ask the question, "what kind of man is this?" alluding to the fact that Jesus was NOT an ordinary man but was also divine.

Scripture begins with the creation of all of nature as the work of God. So, it is not surprising or wrong or less than, for people to find God in nature. In fact, scripture

> encourages us to see nature as a message from or a way to know God. Psalm 19 says:

<sup>1</sup>The heavens are telling the glory of God,

and the firmament proclaims his handiwork.

<sup>2</sup>Day to day pours forth speech,

and night to night declares knowledge.

<sup>3</sup>There is no speech,

nor are there words; their voice is not heard; 'yet their voice goes out through all the earth and their words to the end of the world.

This October, our Wednesday morning online Bible study and meditation will look at what creation has to teach us about God as we embark on a new study, "We Are Standing on Holy Ground." It is appropriate as we head towards Thanksgiving, that we look at all that God has given to us in this amazing world. All around us is evidence of God's love and blessing.

In keeping with the theme of "Holy Ground," This month's recipe on page 2 pays homage to the bountiful gifts of the earth and reminds us of the sacred connection we have with nature. This Heavenly Harvest Salad is not only delicious but also a celebration of the blessings bestowed upon us.

# **Heavenly Harvest Salad**



### **Ingredients:**

- •4 cups mixed greens (lettuce, spinach, arugula)
- •1 cup roasted butternut squash, cubed
- •1 cup pomegranate seeds
- •1/2 cup candied pecans (see below)
- •1/2 cup crumbled feta cheese
- •1/4 cup dried cranberries
- •1/4 cup balsamic vinaigrette dressing
- •Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- •1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
- •1/2 tsp garlic powder

### **Candied Pecans Ingredients:**

- •1 cup pecan halves
- •1/4 cup granulated sugar
- •1 tablespoon water
- •A pinch of salt

### Instructions:

### 1. Roast the Butternut Squash:

- •Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C).
- •Toss the cubed butternut squash with a little olive oil, salt, pepper, cayenne and garlic powder.

•Spread the squash on a baking sheet and roast for about 20-25 minutes or until it's tender and slightly caramelized. Let cool.

### 2. Prepare Candied Pecans:

- •In a non-stick pan, combine the sugar, water, and a pinch of salt over medium heat.
- •Add the pecan halves to the pan and stir continuously.
- •Continue to cook until the sugar has completely melted and coats the pecans in a golden caramelized glaze.
- •Transfer the candied pecans onto parchment paper to cool, then break them into small pieces.

### 3. Assemble the Salad:

•In a large salad bowl, combine the mixed greens, roasted butternut squash, pomegranate seeds, candied pecans, crumbled feta cheese, and dried cranberries.

### 4. Dress the Salad:

- •Drizzle the balsamic vinaigrette dressing over the salad
- •Gently toss the salad to evenly distribute the dressing and ingredients.
- •Season with additional salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste, if desired.
- **5. Serve and Enjoy:** Share this Heavenly Harvest Salad with your church community, friends, or family, and remind everyone of the beauty of God's creation and the blessings of the earth.

# **Trustee News**

### **LEASING/INCOME PRODUCING OPPORTUNITIES**



In addition to updating our campus with security cameras and maintaining and updating our landscaping, etc., the Governing Board, as trustees of Velda Rose UMC, are looking at new income-producing opportunities involving leasing parts of our property.

The first opportunity is with a company looking to build a cell tower on a corner of the empty lot on the western edge of our property. The terms of this lease are still in negotiation and we are fine-tuning the terms of the lease. The second opportunity is a preschool business that is interested in renting our nursery building. In order to offer the nursery building for rent, we have been painting and updating the building so it is ready to provide care and shelter for children. The building has already passed inspection by the Fire Marshall. The Preschool will have to be licensed by the Arizona Department of Childcare, which may require additional

minor repairs or changes to the building. We hope to present this second opportunity at our Church Conference on October 16.

We are also having discussions with 'Circle the City' and 'Family Promise' nonprofits about the possibilities of long -term leases on portions of our vacant lots for them to build a medical rehabilitation center and 6 to 12 small single story affordable rental homes. Initially it appeared that the Family Promise opportunity would move forward quickly, possibly even coming to the church for a vote in early October. For business reasons, Family Promise decided to take a more measured approach to developing a project in Mesa.

We believe that these opportunities will provide additional revenue to support our ministry and expand our connections to the community. Be assured, members of the Governing Board, as trustees are continuing to research and pursue opportunities to develop our property in ways that are consistent with our mission, will be of service and value to Mesa, and fiscally responsible. We hope to have final terms for some of these opportunities to present at the Church Conference on October 16, 2023.

What is the point of the story about Jonah? Hint: It's not about the fish




You may have learned about Noah or Jonah or Zacchaeus as a child, but have you studied them recently? It should not come as a surprise that what we teach children about Bible stories is not all there is to learn from them. Much the way math taught to children is simplified so they can understand it, what children are taught about the Bible is also simplified. Sadly, unlike math, which we continue to study into high school and often beyond learning ever more complex concepts, many of the Bible stories taught to children are not studied as adults. Worse yet, even if they are studied, they may not be studied in more detail and the complexities of the stories may remain a mystery.

In this series, we will look at what may be familiar Bible stories but from an adult perspective. In the process, we will see that these stories have much to teach us about our faith, about God, and even about ourselves. The worship series will begin on October 8 and run through

November.

The Wednesday afternoon study (4 pm) with Pastor Ann, based on the book by Josh Scott, will start on October 4, in Martin Hall (AC permitting) with dinner to follow at 5:30. The class and dinner are free. An optional \$15 donation will offset the cost of the book, which will be available the first day of class. A goodwill offering will be taken to help offset the cost

Later, it is revealed that the three men are representatives of God who promise Abraham and Sarah that they will have a son within a year despite the fact that Sarah is of advanced age. But the story begins with the hospitality that Abraham provides. He welcomes the three strangers, gives them water and food, a place to rest, and all without expecting anything in return. Hospitality involves opening our hearts, homes, churches, and lives to others, especially those who are unfamiliar or different from us. "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that

some have entertained angels without knowing it." – Hebrews 13:2.

**October 2** Workers need to be sure to wear their badge when coming into the building

October 2-6 (7 a.m. to 10 a.m.) is the last week for worker-family and friend shopping. Family and friends (no more than 2 at a time) must be accompanied by the worker.

October 16 (Monday) Last day to drop off items.

October 17 (Tuesday) Pre-Sale Meeting for all workers, 10 a.m. in Moore Hall.

**October 9-20** is for workers only and workers can buy.

October 24 (Tuesday) Help is needed getting the tents up. Once the tents are up, we need

many people to help empty the pods, arrange items, clean, and price items for the sale.

October 23, 24, and 25 are workers only (no friends and/or family) and there are no sales. This gives the departments time to put finishing touches to their shelves and/or racks prior to the sale opening. Help is needed on Wednesday the 25<sup>th</sup> with cleaning and arranging and pricing items coming out of the pods.

**October 28 (Saturday) after the Sale.** Help is needed in getting everything taken down and put back into the building.

# **Implicit Bias Training October 19 & November 16**

IF YOU ARE OUT WALKING and you happen upon a bear, or a mountain lion, how would you react? When you see a traffic light turn red, what do you do? Do you think about it first? Did you know that roughly a third of America's CEOs are taller than 6'2" even though a very small percentage of the population is that height or more? The same phenomenon with U.S. Presidential Candidates – statistically, throughout history, the taller candidate has a better chance of winning. These are all examples of implicit bias.



The fact is, we can all see things differently. In this famous illusion, some see an old woman, and some a young one. It depends on our bias, and sometimes our perspective.

Back in the '90s, a couple of psychologists named Mahzarin

Banaji and Anthony Greenwald coined the term implicit bias when they theorized that social behavior is largely influenced by unconscious associations and judgments. Implicit bias (aka unconscious bias) is the automatic associations and

assumptions we make about other people without even thinking about it.

The trouble with implicit bias is that our automatic assumptions influence the way we treat people, often in unfair ways. Becoming aware of our implicit bias is an important step in growing to love our neighbors the way Jesus loves.

You are invited to learn about the unconscious associations and judgments you make about other people and the world in the upcoming workshop, "Counteracting Bias: Seeing People as They Are," sponsored by Velda Rose United Women in Faith. The four-hour Implicit Bias Training will be broken into two 2-hour sessions, the first on October 19, and the second on November 16, both from 1-3 pm.

# **Desert Southwest UM Foundation Gift Planning**



Rev. Diamond Pate, who pastors the Flagstaff Federated Community

Church, received a grant from the Desert Southwest United Methodist Foundation to help defray the cost of participating in the Wesley Pilgrimage 2023. Approximately 40 clergy and lay leaders from across the US attended the 2023 gathering, designed to explore the history and founding of the Methodist movement in England.

Following the footsteps of John and Charles Wesley, the pilgrims visited the Wesley family birthplace in Epworth, ultimately traveling to Oxford, Bristol, and London. Throughout the ten-day spiritual journey – and after voluminous reading in preparation for the Wesley Pilgrimage – the group regularly learned from historians and theologians.

Perhaps the most powerful moment for Diamond came at Bristol, the site of the New Room, constructed after the floor collapsed in their borrowed meeting space. Seeing the space and learning about the trials of the movement at that time – which was out of step with the general practices of the era – led to her realization about the resilience of Methodism. Diamond noted, "Whatever hurdles we're facing now we can still survive and seek revival today."

She takes that inspiration and message back to her own congregation, where she can share the stories and connect them to that "Wesleyan energy." And she is extremely grateful for the Foundation's grant. "The Foundation helped with travel costs not



covered by the scholarship. I would not have been able to accept the scholarship without the grant from the Foundation."

Helping inspire and support Methodist projects and support clergy is just part of what the Desert Southwest United

Methodist Foundation does in our ongoing quest to Do More Good.
